

Setting Your Goals


What type of creative writing?

The Writing Process





Are you a planner or a pantser?

Some people thrive with structure, but don't let it become procrastination from actually writing.

Only sitting and writing will result in you writing.

There are no rules in creative writing. The limit is your imagination.

You must silence your inner editor.

Editing and publishing is an entirely different step.

Writing Prompts

Writing prompts can help get started and avoid the feeling of not knowing what to write. Develop a plan to write based on prompts. You can start small. Maybe, "Every Saturday. I will spend a half hour writing to a prompt."

Don't Miss the Sparks of Interesting Ideas

Many writers carry a small notebook and pen with them at all times.

If you see something unexpected: write a quick note

If you overhear an odd statement: write a quick note

If you think of an idea: write a quick note

At another time when you are sitting down to write, you can flip through your notebook and have many things to work with.

Start with the End in Mind

Some people find having a clear goal an easier way to begin.

Look up publications where you may want to see your work?

Are they looking for writing on a specific theme? Is there a contest you'd like to join?

https://www.newpages.com/ has calls for submissions.

You can start writing with this goal. Even if it doesn't end up getting published by the place you chose, you may have a nice piece of creative writing to work with.

The First Draft

See if something you've written so far is calling to you to keep writing it and expand it into a longer work.

- Maybe it can become a short story, an epic poem, a book of poetry, a novel, or a memoir.
- For the first draft, you want to write as much as possible and strive toward reaching the end.
- Avoid the urge to go back to revise and edit while you are drafting.



National Novel Writing Month



For some people, having a deadline is the best way to actually get a draft written.

National Novel Writing Month challenges you to write a 50,000-word first draft of a novel in one month. www.nanowrimo.org

✤You must silence your inner editor and write quickly to meet your goal.

A support structure of other writers doing the same project can help stay motivated.

Revising

Many of the world's most renowned writers believe that revising is the most important step of the writing process.

Revise multiple times, focusing on different elements in each version:

- Imagery
- Character
- Language
- Sensory details
- When you feel you've made it the best you can on your own, find a reader you trust to give you honest feedback about what you've written.

Revise another draft based on their comments.



Editing

Once the text is as good as it will get, move onto the editing phase.

The editing phase focuses only on the mechanical aspects of writing.

- Is everything spelled correctly?
- Are the sentences grammatically sound?
- If someone can help you with this phase, that is great as well.



Publishing

Now that you have something written, how do you want to share it with the world?
