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
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TAJMAHAL

Coming from Pakistan, it is always hard to get an Indian visa because of India and Pakistan tensions. From the time I was married to an Indian national, I knew that one day I would visit my ancestor's hometown and explore some iconic and historical places, especially the Taj Mahal.

What I did not know then were the circumstances during which I would visit the Taj Mahal. With grief and sorrow, we said goodbye to all our relatives and my still sick mother-in-law. Her eyes were empty as if they were begging us not to go. I had a feeling that I wouldn't be able to see her again, but I couldn't do anything. We started our journey by road with a heavy heart; I had made plans for this specific road trip to the Taj Mahal, but because of my mother-in-law's deteriorating condition, it didn't materialize as I thought.

It was a nice sunny day and not chilly nor foggy during our stay at Amroha. Around 8:30 a.m., my husband, daughter and I started our road trip to Delhi, with a stop at the Taj Mahal. On the way to the Taj Mahal, fast food carts lined the streets, which made those roads special as they bind the soul. During our travels, we moved through some heavily populated areas; I could see different types of people: some feeling underprivileged and some wearing nice clothing as if they were going to work.

After almost a two-hour drive and located in a deserted area, we stopped for a lunch break in a quiet restaurant. Only three young adults were inside the restaurant and enjoying the food. I ordered a sandwich, my husband ordered vegetables and bread and my daughter ordered french fries and ice cream. After taking a short stopover, which was less than an hour, we started our journey again. It took us five hours to reach Agra (the city where the Taj Mahal is located).

Finally, we reached our destination: the most beautiful, iconic monument and a symbol of eternal love, the Taj Mahal. Built in the 16th century, King Shah Jahan created it in memory of his late wife, Mumtaz Mahal; the beauty was everlasting.

When we entered the building, we had to stand in a big long queue to get the entrance ticket. We hired a tour guide, and he helped us get a ticket a little quicker. He knew we were traveling from aboard, so he was looking for a good tip.

The long path to the main building was nearly 1 mile. The Taj Mahal's main gate was astonishingly beautiful; the carving was inspired by Persian, Islamic and Indian architecture. The white marble gave a spiritual feeling. The tomb is the centerpiece of a 17-hectare complex, including a mosque, guest house, garden, mausoleum, rest house and the main gateway. All three sides are covered with gardens with a crenelated wall.

The unique and most spectacular feature of the Taj Mahal is the white marble dome that is nearly 35 meters high. There are four minarets on each side, which are 137 meters in height to emphasize the beauty of the main dome. The main chamber houses the false sarcophagi of Mumtaz Mahal and Shah Jahan, but the actual graves are lower, where the general public is not allowed.

While I enjoyed the calligraphy's exceptional beauty on the walls, my 5-year-old daughter did not have an interest in any of it, and she kept pulling me to go outside the building. We came to the back of the Mahal in this tussle, and there we could see the River Yamuna behind the building.

I could easily see the river where some underprivileged children were taking baths. While standing on the iconic building, the people's plight made my heart feel like it was bleeding. I couldn't see any beautiful and upscale areas; I could only see the destitute and poverty-stricken people whose faces have moments of kindness and fleeting smiles.

I could not understand why the surroundings were dilapidated.

Every year, millions of tourists visit the Taj Mahal, which generates money, but where does this money go? With these thoughts in my mind, we started our journey back home. During the flight, I was uncomfortable, as if I had left something precious.



AMROHA

Four years ago, my family and I returned from Amroha, a small town approximately 100 miles from Delhi. We had to take the Emirates flight to the U.S. It was a sad and surreal day because bidding goodbyes were always difficult for me, especially with international travel and leaving behind loved ones, as you never know when you could meet them again.

I was visiting my in-laws with my husband and daughter in India. My mother-in-law had taken ill and had to be moved from Lucknow to Amroha, her hometown. The distance was nearly 260 miles and approximately a nine-hour drive.

Amroha has a population of 198,471 people, roughly equal to Montgomery, Alabama. Located in Uttar Pradesh, the city boasts of a magnificent and spiritual past because of the presence of Sufi Saint Shahwilayat's tomb.

The Saint's tomb has a special and unbelievable feature. The devotees believed that even a poisonous insect-like scorpion validated the sanctity of the Saint's tomb by refraining from attacking the followers. I witnessed this myself by keeping a scorpion in my hand, and it did not sting.

The real treasure of Amroha is the warmth, which bound me forever; I still remember my first visit to Amroha. As I first stepped into the Amroha train station, wading through its clustered neighborhoods and narrow by-lanes, gazing at the many shrines that adorn the land; the city soothes me with an unwavering faith that resonates through every aspect. The city is immersed in the spell of spirituality and upholds its age-old traditions with unfaltering sincerity.

When I met my in-law's extended family, the love and warmth I got from them were immense. Though I couldn't find leisure, luxury and comfort, compared to my home, I found tranquility, acceptance and serenity. On the other hand, the amorphous houses in Amroha depict the government's inability to develop the place. The open sewage lines were why most people suffered from malaria or the dengue virus. The muddy and small streets were always packed with pedestrians, auto-rickshaws and cycle-rickshaws. Some streets in the city consist of clustered and narrow lanes, so it is best to explore the city on foot, and I really experienced this.

Both of the visits to Amroha were in winter, so I was not fortunate to gorge on the delicious mango, "Amawat." However, I enjoyed the fresh green vegetables of the season, which came daily from nearby orchards.

My husband's decision to renovate his ancestral home made everyone in the family happy; it was a clear sign that he would want to revisit Amroha. His mother left Amroha after she got married some thirty years ago, and, after the death of my father-in-law, it was hard for her to live alone in Lucknow with her only daughter, so she decided to move back.

When I saw the renovated house, I couldn't believe that it was the same house from two years ago; from the main entrance door to the interior design, everything was new. We replaced the broken wooden door with a big, black steel door. The front room used to have a cement floor, which was replaced by a mosaic floor with big black and white stones. The rooms were spacious with walk-in closets compared to the old ones. My husband's uncle had renovated the house with love and care and gave it a new and modern look. The original house had many childhood memories that my husband cherished, such as the noisy wildlife around the village, but even then, he decided to give a new look to the old memories.

Upon returning to the U.S., my mind was still in India, and just two days later, my mother-in-law passed away in peace; those eyes filled with hope closed forever.

After we dropped off our bags, we headed toward the beach. The Ocean Club Hotel has a collection of brown wicker lounge chairs set up in their section, with corresponding orange towels hanging over the back of the chairs.

The Cape May beaches offer the same appeal as any other beach, but with slightly more style. The beaches are much cleaner, with no litter or garbage in sight. Several hotels provide outdoor furniture, such as lounge chairs, all of which are in great condition and clearly well-maintained.

Beach Avenue also boasts a specialty fudge shop, the Original Fudge Kitchen. This storefront is well known for their gourmet fudge and iconic saltwater taffy. The shop seems to always be packed to the brim with eager customers, so much so that just getting to the register to pay was a challenge.

HOBOKEN

Hoboken is a city aligned on the Hudson River, a place rich in activities for all ages. The city is a popular tourist area of Hudson Gounty, as it is easily accessible to both New York and New Jersey residents. You do not need a car to experience everything this city has to offer. A walking tour from uptown Hoboken to downtown is doable in this one-square-mile city. As you walk down the old-world cobblestone of the side streets and backstreets, you can window shop various boutiques, gift shops and popular retail stores within walking distance. Look for Hoboken favorites pop-up shops, like Hudson Paperie, with a chance to write a thoughtful handwritten note about your day adventure at Hoboken. Stop by Peper and Parlor for some designer apparel, and strut your new shoes as you walk along Washington Street, A sweet snack from Carlo's Bakery, showcased in the hit series "Cake Boss," will satisfy your sweet tooth, but expect a line in waiting to see Carlo's massive confectionary creations.

The most popular way to get from New York City to Hoboken is by PATH subway, but this is only one of the many options to get here. Hoboken has a complete shuttle bus system, a train station and ferries that can transport tourists across the Hudson River from Manhattan or vice versa. There is limited parking space in this area. To overcome this challenge, you can rent a car from Enterprise to have a guaranteed parking space for your day trip in Hoboken, with prices as low as \$32, depending on your requirements.

The Hudson River stretches 18.5 miles and runs alongside multiple New Jersey towns such as Bayonne, Jersey City and West New York. Feel the warmth of the sun as the water glistens in all directions, departing from the Hoboken Ferry Terminal, almost as if you were walking on water. You don't have to be on a boat to experience the breeze of the river. Walk alongside the never-ending spread of crystal blue water, and watch the boats glide across the Hudson River as this painting brings the New York skyline to life. The wooden benches scattered across the black metal railing separates you from the gentle crashing of water beneath the Hudson River Waterfront Walkway. Trees and shrubs lie side by side to separate bikers from pedestrians, as they still experience passersby's interactions afoot on the sturdy checkered brown brick road. At night, the Hoboken Waterfront enraptures the panorama of lighting from the cascading skyscrapers of Manhattan, almost as if you were looking at a picture in travel magazines.

On your way towards Hoboken's south waterfront, visit one of the many public parks. Pier A Park's hundreds of large caliper trees creep into perspective when you step foot onto the green grass. The greenery of the pier extends several hundred feet out into the Hudson River. You are greeted with picnic blankets spread across the clear open space of grass, and families gathered flying kites captured by the river's breeze. Take a free yoga class at Pier A, and enjoy a relaxing stretch with a view closer to the New York skyline. Stay close to the southern walkway side; the road will split and guide you to a swiveling wooden bridge toward a floating oasis above the river. An urban vibe of the giant playground in Pier C Park satisfies all ages, separating into different activity sections. This main playground offers athletic challenges for older kids and adults and features a treehouse-like structure. Families prepare for the main attraction, the beach area, with shovels and buckets. The sandpits sit between the toddler's playground and the main playground.

Two rows of trees divide the walkway, bike lane and Frank Sinatra Drive, to ensure pedestrians and bikers safety. The wide variety of restaurants alongside Frank Sinatra Drive is guaranteed to satisfy your cravings. Hoboken proudly holds the title of "most bars per capita in America," with over 120 drinking establishments, from dives to bistro pubs, held in outdoor settings to abide by the coronavirus (COVID-19) guidelines. Pier 13, on North Sinatra Drive, took every advantage of the guidelines by enhancing their outdoor bar to soak in more of the view of the skyline with smaller crowds and a seating area for their food trucks. Tourists can take detailed tours with travel guides to get the most out of this day trip. The tours' prices are around \$60 per person, with the best highlights of the Empire State Building, Chrysler Building and Lower Manhattan.

The serenity of the Hudson River Waterfront Walkway is more than just a tourist spot. For some, it is a break away from the commercial offices in the area and a commonplace for workers to pass to and from work. The beautiful scenery of the river can melt away the daily stresses of many. There is more to a walk or jog with a never-ending panoramic view of the city. A piece of pedestrian heaven like this does not have a price tag; you will feel safe within the division of beautiful tree-lined paver pathways as you walk, jog or bike to your next destination.

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SEASIDE

HEIGHTS

Seaside Heights in New Jersey is home to many beautiful attractions, being one of the most popular destinations in the state. Within the township, there are countless arcades, rides and eateries that will keep you busy for the entirety of your stay. However, the best way to spend your time there is on the beach. During the summer, entertainment revolves around the shorefront. Watch free movies on the beach or join a game of beach volleyball with your family. Seaside is a small town which means that you will see locals going for walks or riding their bikes along the community. Tourists can take a dinner cruise along the shoreline or charter a deep-sea fishing boat from the day to experience Seaside Heights from another perspective.

Seaside Heights was also the location of the popular MTV show, Jersey Shore. Seaside Heights is located on a long narrow barrier island Newark Liberty International Airport and Philadelphia International Airport.

Both are about 70 miles from Seaside Heights. The destination is ideal to get to by car or bus but, has heavy traffic flow during the summer.

You can also enjoy dining and the view or plan your event at the Liberty House Restaurant and Events. Similarly, Exchange Place gives you somewhere you can jog and feel safe. You can spend a night at the Hyatt Regency, which is on the Hudson River at the Exchange Place, and enjoy the beautiful view of NYC skylines. India Square, also known as Little India, is a street in Jersey City that is an eating spot for Indians. The street is a perfect site to explore the culture and street food of India. 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PRINCETON

A great way to spend a day in New Jersey is to take in a play and enjoy delicious food. Traveling to Princeton is a great way to do that. The city is beautiful and rich with culture, with a college-town vibe to it.

Princeton borders Middlesex County to the south, and one way to get to Princeton from the county is by taking the Northeast Corridor line of New Jersey Transit in either Metuchen, Edison or New Brunswick. It does involve a short transfer of trains, but it beats sitting in traffic on Route 1. The train will cost \$7.75 for a one-way trip leaving New Brunswick, double that for a round-trip. Once you get off the train in Princeton Junction, take the Dinky into Princeton. The Dinky is a train similar to the Path train. It's a short five-minute ride on the Dinky train with stunning, picturesque visuals: tall beautiful trees in the backyards of beautiful homes.

Right outside of Princeton Train Station, there's a newly-renovated Wawa to grab something quick for your convenience. For those who want to dine in right before the show, The Dinky Bar & Kitchen is right across the street from McCarter Theatre Center.

The Dinky Bar & Kitchen doesn't take reservations, so just walk in and request a table. An interesting fact is the building that houses the Dinky Bar & Kitchen used to be the Dinky train station. They serve pub-style food like a soft pretzel with honey mustard dip for \$8. For those with dietary restrictions, there's a veggie burger option for \$14. It helps if you tell the waitstaff you have tickets to a matinee or evening show. They'll do what they can to make sure your food comes out on time so you're not late.

McCarter Theatre Center produces plays ranging from "A Christmas Carol" to "Baskerville: A Sherlock Holmes Mystery." It's important to note that McCarter has two separate theaters, the Matthews Theatre and the Berlind Theatre. Your tickets will have the name of the theatre the show will be held in.

There's also one American Sign Language (ASL) interpreted performance per show. It's quite fascinating to watch the interpreter ers sign as the performance is happening.

Tickets can cost up to \$75. It depends on the day of the week and time of the show. They do offer discounts; it would be a good idea to call the box office to see what they offer. Their shows run between 90 minutes without intermission and 2 hours and 15 minutes, including intermission. It does run a little cool in the theater, so bring a sweater just in case.

The concessions bar is open before the show and during intermission depending on the running time of the show. Their concessions bar serves snacks, such as chips, pretzels, trail mix, pastries, soft drinks and spirits. Be sure to get their travel cup, and you'll be able to take your drink into the theater with you. Concessions will cost \$2 to \$8 depending on the item.

After the show, take a walk through Princeton University's campus and head to Nassau Street. Nassau Street has a shop for practically everything. It's a great place to look for dinner after the show. Just off of Nassau Street is a Middle Eastern restaurant called Mamoun's. It's located on Witherspoon Street, a 10-minute walk from the theater. They serve items, such as falafel, shawarma (thinly sliced lamb) and lentil soup. The price ranges from \$2.50 to \$12, but save room for dessert.

Right around the corner is Thomas Sweets Creamery, serving several flavored milkshakes, beignets, and sweet and savory crepes.

If you want a special treat, get the handmade whipped cream. It's worth the calories.

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Spending the day in Princeton with friends is a memory you won't forget and can be done even on a budget.



FARMS

On the first arrival, some breathtaking flowers and trees make up a healthy environment. To take in every part of Duke Farms, you'll need more than one day to explore, hike, bike or observe the landscape and structures. It's located at 1112 Dukes Parkway. W., Hillsborough Township, NJ 08844, and it is a destination for nature lovers.

The Orientation Center, located when you first pull into the gravel parking lot, is housed on the first floor of the historic Farm Barn. With the partial stone building, you can imagine you're back in the early 1900s with the architecture from an old horse and dairy farm.

Taking a step inside, you're at a fork in the road. To the left, visitors can learn about the history of Duke Farms, while on the right, there is a café that draws people in with the refreshing coffee smell. If you turn right, you'll experience the freshest baked good that electrifies your tastebuds. If you turn left, people can view displays and an interactive exhibit to learn about Duke Farms and its mission.

The Orientation Center also lets people find out about upcoming classes and events, offers maps of the entire estate, and views a short film on the history of Duke Farms. Just by visiting the half-acre orientation center, visitors can plan a whole week at the 2,000-acre location.

The architecture James Buchanan Duke commissioned for the land was made from bronze, marble, and stone reproductions are specialized in classical and renaissance styles. Across the entire estate, you'll be able to view carefully crafted statues that were carved from stone as well.

The original buildings have been kept and adapted. So they wouldn't be demolished or constructed anew. Each building is visually different, with history built into them. Learning the history of the entire Duke Farms with every grain of detail for each building, garden, statue, lake, and greenhouse could become time-consuming for just one day. To make sure you explore all the grounds and learn about the history, make sure to plan for more than a day.

The spot, which transports you back to the mid-1900s, is the Hay Barn. Doris Duke used the ruins as an outdoor sculpture gallery, placing individual marble statues of human figures in linear arrangements along the walls. That can still be seen today as a monument towards her. Visitors can step into the shoes of Doris Duke and view the sculptures she created while taking a seat on benches to admire them as well.

Duke Farms even offers hiking and biking trails if you want to get a workout in the process or skim past everything. Duke Farms offers 18 miles of trails to travel through woodlands, meadows, fountains, sculptures, buildings, and lakes. With each destination, the audio tours share the significance of the native habitat built for wildlife.

If you want to take a more slow-paced stroll through part of the estate, make sure to visit the other end of the Great Meadow, which is the biggest open field at Duke Farms, the Orchid Range. It's a greenhouse in the form of a palm house with numerous bright-colored orchids. Be prepared to step into another world with vines, subtropical and tropical orchids, flowers, a fountain, and the enormous pond under the bridge that is a home for different fish and frogs. You'll be able to spend most of the day in just this one building captivating over all the different plants under one roof.

Make sure to bring a picnic blanket and your camera with a nice outfit, along with different poses in mind for the perfect photograph. All along, Duke Farms are enthralling spots to be able to pause in your day and marvel at the surroundings. Every square inch is a spot to stand and smile in front of the camera, from the older-style architecture to the gardens, meadows, lakes, and the Great Falls waterfall.

The open fields throughout the entire estate are perfect for reading a book or bringing some food, and hanging out with friends to relax throughout the day. Duke Farms has everything people need when it comes to having a quiet place to relax. The distance needed to jog, hike, or bike, stunning buildings to discover, and nothing but nature to appreciate. With over 2,000 acres of land, people can visit a different spot every time they visit Duke Farms unless they want to revisit the same place to take it all in.

It also consists of a 12-foot water feature that allows guests to throw in coins to make wishes.

During the summer months, people of all ages gather to enjoy the warm water and scenic views of New Jersey's southernmost beach. With activities such as boogie boarding, kayaking, and windsurfing, this place offers many opportunities to have some wholesome family time. However, watch out for the seagulls as they will viciously steal any food brought onto the beach.

If you are hungry, Atlantic City has many five-star restaurants that line the boardwalk. For a more family-oriented atmosphere, stop at the Rainforest Cafe to experience the sights and sounds of the Amazon rainforest. As you eat, elephant, gorilla, and snake animatronics will consistently pop-out to make you feel like you are eating in the Amazon. The doors of the hotel open to a large entryway that has a magnificent 13-foot guitar hanging from the ceiling. On the lower level lay the casino with over 2,000 slot machines and 147 tables. Visitors should look around as the music-inspired place holds memorabilia of famous singers and songwriters, including Michael Jackson, Frank Sinatra, and Elvis Presley. In fact, a display hidden behind the elevators showcases Presley's Rolls Royce as well as Prince's guitar. The upper levels of the hotel have many luxurious shops that include jewelry, Hard Rock merch, and replicas of rock icons. As for family fun, this place will allow children into the hotel; however, I advise leaving the kids at home as the Hard Rock is an adult paradise.

At night, Atlantic City comes to life with hundreds of neon lights. It is a beautiful sight to witness all the intricate details of each casino as they are lit up in different colors. Make sure to bring a camera, as you will want to capture these breathtaking moments.


If you are into gambling and sports, I recommend going down to the Monmouth horse tracks. You get the fun of watching competition and might even leave with extra money in your pocket.



Middlesex College Ecology Alumna, Megan Martinez, lands an internship she loves with Cape May Whale Watcher & Research Center, documenting whales and dolphins while educating tourists.

The Cape May Whale Watcher & Research Center's mission is to promote the conservation of marine mammals and their environment through photo-identification research, education, and outreach.

"This has been the best experience I've ever had. Photographing whales and dolphins all day and learning their behavior and even their names. It's been the most exciting time I've ever had, I can't wait for future seasons," Martinez said.

Martinez takes photographs of marine mammals on whale and dolphin watching trips, GPS and data collection processing in Excel, Atlantic Bottlenose Dolphin fin matching, and analysis. Plus, passenger education, which includes leading a touch

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tank, and whale baleen. Also, marine debris presentation, maintenance of collected local species tanks, and contributing to the research blog. "A huge part of this is talking to passengers and explaining all the marine life in the ocean when we do the four different trips. It's a great chance to help you remember the information and express the passion I have towards marine life," Martinez said.

Each time Martinez is on the boat, her team photographs marine life while recording the GPS coordinates, data for weather and sea conditions, behaviors, group sizes, the presence of neonates, associations, surface intervals, and other specific case studies.

Martinez and her team have documented over 500 distinct individuals in the inshore coastal Bottlenose Dolphin catalog. In addition, it contributes to a more extensive database based out-of Duke University and OBIS-SEAMAP, the Mid-Atlantic Bottlenose Dolphin Catalog.

After Middlesex College, she transferred to Rutgers University, New Brunswick Campus School of Environmental and Biological Sciences, majoring in Marine Science.

While there, Martinez applied for the Cape May Whale Watcher & Research Center internship and got accepted over a year ago.

Martinez works on the boat three to four times a week while working around her Rutgers University schedule.

By always showing up and working hard at the internship, Martinez received a job offer for the boat, and she accepted.

"I love this boat with my whole heart. The animals I get to see and the crew I get to work with are so amazing, and I got so lucky. I can't wait to start officially working here

in the fall," said Martinez.

"I encourage students to apply for internships that won't feel like work but feel like a vacation and when you get the position, give it your all. It could lead to a huge job opportunity that will let you have more experience in the field," Martinez said.



Jasmine Bundy, a 2007 alumni, received an associate degree for Social and Rehabilitation Services.

"This major was the closest to a pre-social work program and being a part of the Democracy House program was the biggest impact Middlesex had on me," Bundy said.

In October 2005, Bundy joined Democracy House, a campus organization dedicated to serving the local community. As a member, she helped single mothers learn creative writing at Mama's Crossing, located next door to the Transitional Housing Unit for Women.

Bundy said, "It was very impactful in terms of making those connections. I think sometimes we think [because it's] community college, we're not going to make connections because it's everyone you went to high school with, but it definitely made my experience."

She was able to give speeches at different conferences during the Democracy House's after-school program, as well as give back at Elijah's Promise.

"It's so much more than just an associate degree. That gave me the most in terms of soft skills, in terms of being able to go interview for a position," Bundy said. "What I did with Democracy House definitely helped with that because we got to learn how to speak publicly, how to run meetings, how to work with directors at different organizations and be their support."

Bundy applied to nonprofit organizations for different positions that involved working with the youth while attending Middlesex College. Her work with the community earned her part-time positions based on her experience.

"If you're a traditional age student and you're coming right out of high school, you think 'I can't do that because I just started or I'm too young," said Bundy. "I remember being 19-years-old and being a presenter at a conference to other students that were older than me and to their actual site supervisors. So, it forced me to take on leadership responsibilities very early on."

"That really made it easier for me to embrace leadership with confidence as I got older, to start applying for positions in my own career. I am truly grateful for the leadership role that I was put into," Bundy said.

After Middlesex College, Bundy transferred to Kean University to get to know the professors because of their small classes. She didn't want to be one of many, she

wanted to get to know faculty members.

While at Kean University, Bundy continued to be involved in the campus and made many connections with the faculty.

"I found it easier from my experience at Middlesex [College] to connect with the faculty because I was not intimidated." said Bundy.

After graduating from Kean in 2009 with a Bachelor of Arts in sociology, Bundy received her master's degree in nonprofit management in higher education with a master's in sociology.

The National Honor Society would also come up with donations for the members and students to participate in, Rodriguez would help and donate when she could.


Understanding that campus life and socialization help bring students together to further their education, Rodriguez also joined the Educational Opportunity Fund Program (EOF) as a student member.

"I'm currently learning a new language for my own interest and that will also help me expand my studies later and I plan to




keep taking classes that interest me and my curiosity to then join programs and jobs that help students," Rodriguez said.


The program has provided O'Connor with magical memories that will last him a lifetime with incredible opportunities for his career to grow.

Working at Disney has made Alfrey's dreams come true while making other people's dreams come true at the parks.



"I am honored to have been appointed as the Middlesex College





Lin-Manuel Miranda's "tick, tick...BOOM!" is a love letter to the late playwright Jonathan Larson and all Broadway musicals.

The Netflix original, "tick, tick...BOOM!" is a musical that follows Larson, played by Andrew Garfield, and his thought process on making his musical, 'Superbia.' It is based on Larson's autobiographical musical, "tick, tick...BOOM!," which was rewritten and released in 2001 by playwright David Auburn. Larson is about to turn 30 and is struggling to finish his futuristic musical he has been working on for eight years. It received its first workshop production; however, Larson hasn't written the crucial second-act solo for one of the character's turning points. Larson is trying to finish his musical while working at a diner and balancing his love life along with his friendships.

Throughout the film, it cuts back and forth from the present with Larson trying to finish his musical to Larson performing his "tick, tick...BOOM!" musical. Each time it cuts to Larson's future performance, you think it's what he is thinking at the moment due to it aligning with the timeline, and the song choice illuminates the scene beautifully. Having it cut back and forth isn't distracting; it actually helps the scenes and adds character to Larson's work. Garfield conveys Larson's feelings of urgency alongside the ambition and frustration of an artist who has so much to say but can't figure out how to say it or put it into words.

Fans of Larson will be able to see the film foreshadowing his iconic "RENT" musical. Also, those who appreciate the detail will

It also takes place in the famous Moondance Theater that closed in 2012, a workplace for many future Broadway stars.

The film is filled with numerous cameos everywhere you turn. It stars Robin de Jesús as Larson's best friend, Michael, in "RENT" in 1996. Vanessa Hudgens plays Karessa, the main character in "Superbia," in the film and has played

Mimi and Maureen in various productions, including "RENT Live." In the opening number "30/90," the two men sitting at the table are Roger Bart and James Nicola. Bart was a fellow waiter at the diner with Larson. He participated in the actual "Superbia" workshop. Nicola served as artistic director of the New York Theatre Workshop, where "RENT" debuted Off-Broadway. During the scene where Larson plays a piece in a writers workshop for a panel, Nick Blaemire appears as Larson in the 2016 Off-Broadway revival of "Tick, Tick... BOOM!." There are endless more cameos from people who impacted Larson's life and people from Broadway who have become loved by fans.

The run time is 1 hour and 55 minutes, and it's not enough. "Ghostbusters: Afterlife" was directed by Jason Reitman, son of Ivan Reitman, who directed the first two movies in the 1980s. It is essentially a nostalgia trip and a generational hand-off like "Star Wars: The Force Awakens," but these new kids keep the legacy alive with taste. The movie is not only a homage to the first two films, but overall it's a touching tribute to Harold Ramis, the co-writer and co-star of "Ghostbusters I and II," who passed away in 2014.

The references are enjoyable and make any 'Ghostbusters' fan smile, even if it feels like the camera lingers for too long on some props from the original movies. Then it transitions to him just nodding and standing there while everyone talks to him apologizing and saying their goodbyes. It felt awkward for Spengler to be there as long as he was and not speaking; however, it's better than if he did say anything. Andrew Garfield and Tobey Maguire appearing on screen caused the viewers in theaters to scream with so much delight, it was hard to hear the next minute of the film. The three Spider-Men work together to bring balance to each universe, with help at the end from Strange.

Strange explains how the spell from the beginning of the movie backfired. Instead of people forgetting Parker is Spider-Man, everyone who knows Parker was Spider-Man in other universes were brought to Holland's Spider-Man's universe. The 'Scream' franchise has always been self-aware, riffing on itself as well as the larger horror genre the films are a part of. Just like the first two films where Randy Meeks (Jamie Kennedy) was the film horror expert aiding self-awareness, "Scream 5" has Meeks' niece doing the same exact thing. Mindy Meeks-Martin (Jasmin Savoy Brown) is the new generation's horror expert who finds it thrilling yet knowledgeable to be caught up in this horror show. One of the preeminent scenes is when Meeks-Martin is watching the scene in Stab that is based on Meeks screaming at the TV, "Turn around he's behind you." She listens to the screen screaming but then realizes she's being told to turn around.

With Meeks' family being a part of the new generation to help fans not feel overwhelmed with the younger generation, his sister, Martha Meeks (Heather Matarazzo) from "Scream 3" makes an appearance. This helps the viewer realize that "Scream 5" isn't trying to make a long stretch to create a connection to the original films.

With all of the details Matt Bettinelli-Olpin and Tyler Gillett have in "Scream 5," they might've let viewers have an easier time predicting the Ghostface killer in this film. Sam's boyfriend insists on coming with her to Woodsboro to make sure her sister is okay and safe from Ghostface, which is what a genuine guy would do. However, he claims to never have watched the Stab movies or been a horror fan, and this gets tested throughout the film. For someone who is not a horror fan, he keeps insisting the situation is just like the one in the 'Halloween' movies. Of course, he cannot appear to be obsessed with the Stab movies or he'll not only be a subject of interest but will not have had the trust from the others. In addition to this, Riley tells Sam to suspect her boyfriend, also known as Kirsch, and he's been through this to the point where he even admits that most of the time it's the boyfriend. We can even see that the Ghostface veterans know what they're doing when Prescott and Weathers don't fall for the "help me" trap.

Since it's a 'Scream' movie, we already know there are two killers. Otherwise, how would they be able to do all of the killings and convince the victims they aren't the killers? The second killer isn't as apparent; however, the opening scene lets killers question the tactical moves of Ghostface. The first mistake was texting Tara from her friend Amber Freeman's (Mikey Madison) phone and sending a prerecorded video. If the Ghostface killer is trying to blackmail Tara into playing a game, why would he not just Facetime to show Freeman is about to die? A prerecorded video makes the viewer believe Freeman could be one of the Ghostface killers.

The movie does the complete opposite of letting the fans down. It delivers on every mark that a 'Scream' movie needs. Two Ghostface killers, check. The Ghostface killer being two different people obsessed with either the Stab movies or wanting to kill either Prescott, Weathers or Riley, check. Taking place in a familiar setting, check. When my sister recommended "Jackaby" by William Ritter, I casually told her I'd add it to my list. She gave me a description, and I gave her the usual reply: "That sounds good!" After rereading the same books for months, I decided to give "Jackaby" a shot, and I'm glad I did.

"Jackaby" is a steampunk, historical fiction story taking place in the 1890s. Some have described this book as "Sherlock Holmes" meets "Doctor Who," and some have described this as "Sherlock Holmes" meets "Buffy the Vampire Slayer." I think this is a combination of all three, but you don't need to be a fan of any of the three to appreciate this.

This book alludes to folklore, mythology and the supernatural, with phenomenal writing. "Jackaby" centers around two main characters, Abigail Rook and R.F. Jackaby. Abigail is the narrator of the story and provides a sense of being the voice of reason and showcases the reader's curiosity. This is not a horror story by any means, but Abigail does describe things in such a way that it gives an eerie vibe to the story, and draws the reader in; for instance, her departure from the ship has dark undertones.

Ritter's writing has a dark humor touch like a U.K. sitcom, even though he's from Oregon. Although not every page is action-packed, there is humor and banter between Jackaby and practically every character, making the story feel like the pages are turning themselves.

One aspect that Ritter did exceptionally well was how he wrote Abigail's character. At the time where there were such rigid gender roles, she was fiercely independent and robust. Abigail is a multilayered character who's a mixture of rough-and-tough and femininity. She is probably the first female protagonist that I didn't hate. Abigail is intelligent, practical and witty. She has a genuine interest in Jackaby's work.

I understand the comparisons with Jackaby and Sherlock Holmes and the 11th Doctor from "Doctor Who." His power of observation allows Jackaby to see things others would ignore. He has moments of lacking emotions, therefore lacking tact, which leads to most of the humor, in comparison to Sherlock. There are a few tender moments, which shows the comparison to the 11th Doctor. Seeing that duality within Jackaby makes him an intriguing character.

While I didn't think the mystery was too hard to figure out, many twists and turns, and secondary characters made this story exciting. "Jackaby" is a laugh-out-loud story that will continuously have you wondering what will happen next.

Ine Dark Knight

I first watched "The Dark Knight" in 2009. At that time, I watched it as a normal action movie. After almost twelve years, my perspective of watching this movie has totally changed. Perhaps I am more mature and my analysis is based on which lens I am wearing. There are a number of factors which I noticed and I want to highlight.

Firstly, it is important to understand what ideology is? And how we believe it? "Ideology is a belief system that underpins a political or economic theory." Such as, liberalism, conservatism, socialism, theocracy, totalitarianism, democracy, colonialism and globalism. Dominant ideologies include beliefs about gender roles, economic and social systems.

In the movie Dark Night, we see many dominant ideologies such as the characters Batman, Gordon, Harvey Dent, Lucius Fox, Rachel, they all were trying to prevent the systems. Batman tries to make Gotham city safe and while doing so, he is dominating justice, order, safety and security. He also advances ideologies such as wealth, capitalism, whiteness, masculinity and fascist ideas such as his batman costume. Batman does not challenge the status quo, instead he does whatever he wants to save Gotham city.

On the other hand, we see the criminals want their money to be safe and they are very clear in their motivation. Joker has portrayed alternative ideology, he is totally opposite and believes in the ideology of chaos. He is an anarchist who believes in the destruction of society. The director of the movie Christopher Nolan described Joker as "a psychologically credible anarchist."


In Nolan's imagination, Joker's ideology threatened post 9/11 ethical, moral, conceptual and political perspective. When we examine this through the lens of post 9/11, Joker's character fits as a terrorist who has no rules and who is very unpredictable. A bank robbery scene, a pencil scene, Joker's conversation with gang members and their leader sitting in Hongkong scene. All refers to his chaotic nature. However, he wanted to dissolve the unjust hegemonic structure of the society by threatening the establishment's rules.

Similarly, other characters such as Harvey Dent who said, "You either die a hero or live long enough to see yourself become the villain." Harvey Dent was a district attorney of Gotham city. Whose ideology was to work for the government. Towards the end of the movie, we saw that he became a villain Two-Face. By comparing him with then (9/11) U.S. attorney for Southern District of New York, Rudolph W. Giuliani, he was a hero and pronounced as "America's mayor." If we see him today he is a two-faced person. He ignited people on Jan. 6 capitol riots in which he stated that Trump could still win.

Secondly, we saw inequalities that the hegemonic order strived to claim as normal and healthy such as the character Batman. He does everything but he was not answerable to anyone. His character shows the concept of masculinity as he was shown as a tall,

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strong man who has extraordinary power. A man who has so much power, who is strong in his appearance can do anything if needs to get the work done. We as a nation allow this to happen because we think it is normal and we don't want to question authorities.

Similarly, Rachel character, who was an assistant District Attorney. She was a childhood friend of Bruce Wayne (Batman). In one scene when Batman was about to reveal his identity, Harvey realized the importance of Batman and he himself turned him as a Batman in order to keep Batman's identity safe. Later Rachel confronted Alfred about the lie. Then Alfred told Rachel that Batman is not a normal man but he represented something very special for the city of Gotham. So, here, we see the hierarchical body saved by Alfred by simply saying that it's okay if Batman's identity can be hidden. It is normal and healthy.

In my personal opinion, I see it as an inequality sidelining gender role. For example, Rachel died. She could have saved but all power went to "men" similarly Gordon's assistant role was also not very impressive. Though I waited for something special to be done by her, I did not find anything special. Judge Surrillo was also murdered by Joker.

Third, we see some characters coping with the hegemonic structure. After 9/11 we as a nation, who were so angry at the terrorist, gave consent to use our privacy. According to American Civil liberties Union, "Hastily passed 45 days after 9/11 in the name of national security, the Patriot Act was the first of many changes to surveillance laws that made it easier for the government to spy on ordinary Americans by expanding the authority to monitor phone and email communications, collect bank and credit reporting records, and track the activity of innocent Americans on the Internet. While most Americans think it was created to catch terrorists, the Patriot Act actually turns regular citizens into suspects."

Nearly after 20 years, the executive branch still has power and discretion to exercise massive surveillance when needed. Congress should've acted to stop mass spying or but they never did. What the Bush administration started with mass surveillance, it was continued in the Obama administration. Additionally, in 2008, Congress added Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, which allows warrantless surveillance of Americans' communication which includes our phone calls, emails, chats and web activities.

We as a citizen, all know about the 2013 revelations of Edward Snowden in which he gave details of the U.S. government's surveillance. The shocking revelations of the National Security Agency's PRISM and Upstream programs showed how closely the NSA worked with Facebook, Google, AT&T and Verizon. They conducted wide reaching surveillance of Americans' international communications such as, who has made a call to pastor or an abortion provider or a suicide hotline.

We know how it affected people's lives-especially people of color such as Muslims, Black and Brown People. It is a continuous torture while someone is watching you all the time.

The movie Dark Knight implicitly criticized the policies of the Bush Administration or in other words the system. Christopher Nolan had unfolded the brutal realities and lies of the American system. It revolves around post 9/11 decisions where we saw how the Bush administration had led the War on Terror on lies. The movie shows the frustration of Batman when he was dealing with his enemy (Joker), which ultimately resonated with the American viewer. Nolan has clearly stated, "Welcome to a World Without Rules."

It is easy to fight or war with a country but it is very difficult to fight with an ideology. Sadly, the War on Terror did not have any boundaries and therefore, the consequences were obvious.

Here I want to make a point that after killing Osama Bin Laden and Saddam Hussein, is world free from ISIS terror or global terrorism? Can we say that we don't witness terror after 9/11? Is the world safe now?

The answer to all the above questions is "No." The system which was shown in the movie that the surveillance is okay, even though the character Lucius Fox said that it is not right but he did not do much. Thus, the Batman is going after an enemy who is impalpable and cannot be identified easily which left him sightless and vulnerable.

It is similar to the character of Harvey Vent in the movie when he had two-faced and when he died, his lies were not publicly condemned instead he became a hero.

Lastly, as Harvey Dent gave a speech to Gotham's people and said, "I Promise you, The Dawn Is Coming." But he lied and tried to protect Bruce. Similarly, we see lies of our elected officials in administration. But we see a hope and optimism because Joker's experiment went wrong and therefore, faith in humanity is reinstated.

Just recently, someone recommended watching Starship Trooper. Usually, I do not like to watch Sci-Fi movies, but I was in a different mood, so I started to watch.

While I was watching the first scene, I was skeptical of whether the movie was a comedy or serious. But there was something that kept me glued to the screen. Perhaps I liked the way director portrayed the female protagonist as a solid and intelligent recruit, or maybe the story was going very smoothly. Whatever was the reason I finished watching it in two days as I can't afford to watch a two-hour movie in one sitting.

After watching the entire movie, I had mixed feeling about the genre of the movie. So, I was right. It was a military satire film that focused on nationalism and xenophobia. It had a comprehensive meaning inside. It reminds me of a review written by Susan Sontag in 1974 where she talked about Leni Riefenstahl's "fascist aesthetics "portrayal of Nazis in her film "Triumph of the Will. The movie Starship Trooper has a clear depiction of masculinity. The mise-en-scene of the film was designed to look fascist. However, there are many scenes where we see fascism, but I am going to discuss a little.

That scene is full of satire and camera focused on the logo, massive army in uniform is an example of Germany Nazi images in an artistic way. The troopers and their uniforms were identical to SS at the Nuremberg, Germany rallies.

Most of the dialogues sound fascist, as when sky Marshal Denise (Bruse Gray) stands at a podium and says, "We must... ensure that human civilization, not insect, dominates this galaxy now and always." It was an unmistakable resemblance to Hitler when he addressed the Reichstag.

Similarly, in one scene, we can see Neil Patrick Harris arrived on the set in an SS uniform that is a clear contrast from the Nazi imagery. Most of the dialogues were a clear comparison of how Nazi leaders used to give speeches. And masses used to obey them. It also translates the totalitarian regime when the young generation is vulnerable and unable to understand what the leader is saying. Still, they have to follow as told by Jonny Rico when Rasczak asked, "Tell me the moral difference, if any, between the citizen and the civilian?" Jonny replied, "The difference lies in the field of civic virtue. A citizen accepts personal responsibility for the safety of the body politic, of which he is a member, defending it, if need be, with his life. The civilian does not." Rasczak replied, "The exact words of the text. But do you understand it? Do you believe it?" Jonny replied, "Uh, I don't know."

In the scene mentioned above, we can see the vulnerable soldiers who can't even think about what they are doing but --just obeying.

Then the shower scene was the most subversive, orgiastic, fascistic, and exalt mindlessness. During the conversation in the setting, no recruit cares about the mission of the Mobile Infantry. Such as, one suggested that he wanted to go to Harvard, other recruits explained that she was going to make a difference in politics. One girl said, "I wanna have babies. It's a lot easier to get a license if you've served." Even the protagonist joined only because of his girlfriend. In a span of the two-minute scene, we saw a 90s-style portrayal of Mobile Infantry trainees who (including both men and women) live together where they eat, sleep, and even bath together.

The director of the film Verhoeven told Empire in 2012 that, "The idea I wanted to express was that these so-called advanced people are without libido. "Here they are talking about war and their careers and not looking at each other at all! It is sublimated because they are fascists." In a democratic rule, the state controls daily life in the military (volunteer) and prison. But the movie showed state-owned everything in everyday life. If anyone wants to get personal freedom, one needs to serve in the military.



Lastly, Sontag says, "fascist art glorifies surrender, it exalts mindlessness, it glamorizes death." At the end of the movie, we saw that military men captured the leader of the bug, and it showed that all the bugs now killed glorifies death, and the main bug was afraid. Moreover, we saw the military occupied the bug planet, and United Citizen Federation's soldiers proudly cheered. That is precisely what shows the military brutality and propaganda.

The Switch version at its current state has its flaws which are massive if you're a Kingdom Hearts fan.

Square Enix has decided to port different collections of Kingdom Hearts onto the Nintendo Switch as cloud versions.

A cloud version means that you need to have a really good internet connection to be able to play Kingdom Hearts at all times.

This is unfortunate for when you want to play a franchise this big anywhere at any time, mostly because not all internet connection speeds are made equal.

If I want to play the games on the go at a loved one's place, I won't be able to. This is because they could be having a party which causes the internet speed to be slowed down drastically due to the amount of devices connected to it. It would render me unable to play any of the Kingdom Hearts games on my Nintendo Switch.

I can't even play the cloud versions of Kingdom Hearts outside of North America since the Square Enix headquarters have their servers in California, and they've locked the Kingdom Hearts cloud versions to North America. That renders me unable to

play these versions while on another continent.

Another thing I've noticed with the cloud versions of the Kingdom Hearts games is that you can play the games in handheld or tabletop mode while at home.

Being able to play the Kingdom Hearts games in this fashion isn't bad but it defeats the purpose of having a Nintendo Switch.

When I tried playing any game of the cloud versions of Kingdom Hearts docked on my TV, I ended up with an error message on my Switch. It annoved me, and I was disappointed that I couldn't enjoy playing these games hooked up on my TV.

The gameplay is still faithful to the Kingdom Hearts games that you can see on the PlayStation 2 through PlayStation 4. The controls, however, have been adapted to the Nintendo Switch Joy Cons and Pro Controller. Albeit, there are some lag spikes in terms of frame rate speed depending on how fast or slow your internet is.

The music and characters in Kingdom Hearts are memorable to the point where you begin loving them. I love the characters and the world, and I can see why it took so long for them to appear on the Nintendo Switch.

When the gameplay lags on the cloud versions of the games on the Nintendo Switch, the voices of the characters lag along with the music in the background. That ruins the immersive experi-

I don't think the cloud versions alone justify the \$90 bundle in which you get all the games together in one package off the Nintendo eShop. Neither do they justify getting the three games separately for \$110.

The cloud versions of the Kingdom Hearts games feel inferior to the counterparts of the games you can see on the PlayStation 4 as an all-in-one collection. You can get the all-in-one version as a physical copy for \$30 and not have to worry about having internet connection all the time.

> All in all, I don't recommend that you get the cloud versions of Kingdom Hearts on the Nintendo Switch. I recommend you get the all-in-one collection of the Kingdom Hearts games on the PlayStation 4. The Play-Station 4 versions are superior in every

way with the current state of the Nintendo Switch versions. I wanted to like the Nintendo Switch versions of

this beloved franchise, but it's not worth the price I bought them at. If you've been interested in Kingdom Hearts for a while, I recommend you get the games on the PlaySta-

tion 4 rather







The second season to the twenty-second season of "Top Gear" spanned from 2003-2014 and included "the Grand Tour," which started from 2016 to present day.

What these two shows have in common are hosts: Jeremy Clarkson, James May and Richard Hammond.

They're essentially car journalists that present "Top Gear" and "the Grand Tour" for the mainstream media, who are consumers, to help them decide on what car they want to get.

These three do car reviews mostly to show off the elegance of cars they've been asked to review, especially if the car was new when the episode came out.

What Clarkson, Hammond and May do on the side are races around the world. They need to get from point A to point B for a certain race in a specific country.

"Pokémon" is one of my favorite franchises of all time and one that has changed a lot within the last decade. I loved it a lot, the whole franchise, but I felt like it's changed ever since "Pokémon Shuffle," "Pokémon Sun" and "Pokémon Moon" were released.

At this point, I don't even know what format I prefer with "Pokémon." Nowadays, I feel like it's for me, but at the same time, I feel like it's not because of the changes the franchise has had.

When "Pokémon Shuffle" launched on February 18, 2015, the change in the franchise didn't feel that impact. Mostly because the game was also released that year was "Pokémon Super Mystery Dungeon" on September 17, 2015.

"Pokémon Shuffle" was a puzzle game, and "Pokémon: Super Mystery Dungeon" was a dungeon crawler game with a narrative. "Pokemon: Super Mystery Dungeon" was released on the 3DS, while "Pokemon Shuffle" was released on 3DS and mobile. That was where the change started in the franchise, but there wasn't much of an impact overall yet.

In 2016, the change started to take effect in terms of the "Pokémon" franchise as a whole. Although "Pokémon Go" came out on July 6, 2016 for smartphones, it was a worldwide phenomenon that brought people together by spending a lot of time outdoors.

That phenomenon didn't last long as there is so much you could do when flicking Poké balls, taking over gyms and participating in raid battles. When fall 2016 came around, "Pokémon Sun" and "Pokémon Moon" were released on November 18th, 2016, on the Nintendo 3DS.

"Pokémon Go" along with "Pokémon Sun" and "Pokémon Moon" was where I felt like the franchise started to change as a whole due to the success of "Go" being a mobile game. Mobile games are what people carry with them daily, and Game Freak, the company behind "Pokémon", wanted to capitalize on it.

I felt like this was a good year for "Pokémon" for both the mobile and the console game market. "Pokémon Go" had people start working out, and "Pokémon Sun" and "Pokémon Moon" brought changes to the franchise with the introduction of trials, Totem Pokémon, and Z Moves that replaced the features that came in the previous Pokémon games. Those features are gyms and Mega Evolution.

2017 involved releasing a mobile game called "Pokémon Duel," essentially a "Pokémon" board game. Released on January 24, 2017, it felt like it was a game of Monopoly to me. Unfortunately, "Pokémon Duel" had its server shut down on October 31, 2019, and I didn't play that mobile game that much in general.

The main Pokémon games released on the 3DS were "Pokémon Ultra Sun" and "Pokémon Ultra Moon." These two games came out on November 17, 2017, and there was another shift for the mobile game and console game market again. That shift occurred when the Nintendo Switch came out on March 3, 2017.

When Game Freak saw the popularity of the Nintendo Switch in 2017, they wanted to capitalize on it at some point. They first thought the Nintendo Switch would flop and end up like another Wii U at first. It made sense since third-party companies didn't know how to develop their games for the Switch's predecessor, and the Wii U lasted from 2012-2017.

The Wii U's marketing campaign was bad for consumers to get interested, and Game Freak didn't want it to be a "bad" idea. So they decided to test the waters of the Nintendo Switch by having Bandai Namco port a game called "Pokkén Tournament" to the console by calling it "Pokkén Tournament DX." That idea had turned out well by getting over a million copies sold by March 2018.

2018 was when Game Freak decided to have games developed in-house for the Nintendo Switch, and it was a worldwide phenomenon. I felt like it was a good idea with the idea of "Pokémon Quest," which was released on May 29, 2018, on both the Nintendo Switch and mobile.

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In my mind, Game Freak found the perfect balance in bringing mobile games to the console format, even if it wasn't perfect at first. "Pokémon Quest" was an action-adventure game with an art style similar to "Minecraft." That mobile game had over 7.5 million downloads within its first week of launch.

Later in 2018, the game to capitalize on the success of "Pokémon Go" was called "Pokémon: Let's Go, Pikachul" and "Pokémon: Let's Go Eeveel" was released on November 16, 2018, on the Nintendo Switch. That game had you explore the Kanto region, catch "Pokémon" in the "Pokémon Go" format and battle gyms. I liked the idea of these two "Pokémon" games as they felt a little different from what fans were used to, and you were still in a familiar setting if you grew up playing "Pokémon Red" and "Pokémon Blue."

In 2019, I felt happy to be a fan of the franchise "Pokémon" in general. And the changes to it made me content despite other fans being against it. In terms of mobile games, there were two that were released that year. One was "Pokémon Rumble Rush," which had a Nintendo Wii game called "Pokémon Rumble." "Pokémon Rumble Rush" was released on May 15, 2019, before the servers were shut down on July 22, 2020. I loved the art style and gameplay as I had nostalgic memories of "Pokémon Rumble."

The other "Pokémon" mobile game released in 2019 was called "Pokémon Masters" and released on August 28th, 2019. "Pokémon Masters" played like a role-playing game with Gacha game mechanics built into it. In simple terms, it's gambling combined with role-playing game elements and fan service in the form of "Pokémon." The effort put into the 3D model clothing for the "Pokémon" trainers in "Pokémon Masters" was amazing, and the game is still going on today. I loved how "Pokémon Masters" expanded on the franchise's lore, in general, and had characters that never interacted before interacting with each other.

The only "Pokémon" game released on the Nintendo Switch in 2019 was "Pokémon Sword" and "Pokémon Shield," released on November 15, 2019. Unfortunately, it felt a bit lackluster despite it being part of a new generation of the franchise. I liked it for the music, but the gameplay felt the same for me. At least I'm finally able to play the game on my TV or on the go due to the capabilities of the Nintendo Switch.

A lot happened in 2020 in terms of releases for Pokémon in general. And this is where I felt like where the home console and mobile releases merged completely. February 12, 2020, was the release of "Pokémon Home." That service is available on the Nintendo Switch and mobile, which allows you to move Pokémon over from a storage system on the Nintendo 3DS called "Pokémon Bank" to "Pokémon Home" before being able to send those "Pokémon" to "Pokémon Sword" and "Pokémon Shield." I love that service a lot as it meant that I could see the "Pokémon" I've had over the years on my phone now.

A "Pokémon Mystery Dungeon" game remake called "Pokémon Mystery Dungeon: Rescue Team DX" was released on March 6, 2020. It was a complete reimagining of the original "Pokémon: Red Rescue Team" released on the Nintendo GameBoy Advance and "Pokémon: Blue Rescue Team" released on the Nintendo DS. "Pokémon Mystery Dungeon: Rescue Team DX" played like a dungeon crawler and filled me with a lot of nostalgia and made me cry a lot. It is a spin-off series that gives me a lot of sentimentalities.

Two DLC packs were released for "Pokémon Sword" and "Pokémon Shield" called "The Isle of Armor" and "The Crown Tundra." "The Isle of Armor" was a more story-based DLC released on June 17, 2020. And "The Crown Tundra" was a more exploration-based DLC released on October 22, 2020.

This finally brings us to 2021 with the release of "Pokémon Unite" and "New Pokémon Snap." Again, two games with different mechanics and are a lot of fun in general, gameplay-wise.

"New Pokémon Snap" was released on April 30, 2021, a remake of the original for the Nintendo 64, and is a game where you take photos of "Pokémon." It's pretty relaxing, and being able to see your favorite Pokémon up close in high definition on the Nintendo Switch is amazing.

The "Pokémon Unite" game was released on July 21, 2021, on the Nintendo Switch and later released on mobile on September 22, 2021. The game as a whole played similarly to a game called "League of Legends." A fellow managing editor, Delaila Aguilar, talked about this game in-depth in a review on the fifth issue of the paper released this semester.

Regarding the stuff I don't like about "Pokémon" taking this route for home console and mobile gaming, I'm not happy with how things are locked behind paywalls with microtransactions for you to access everything. It wasn't too prevalent for the "Pokémon" games released on the Nintendo 3DS, but it became prevalent on the games released on the Switch and mobile.

The gameplay for each "Pokémon" game is unique, but it can be tedious at times, depending on the mechanics of each game. Another thing I felt doesn't work having everything for the Switch "Pokémon" games locked behind paywalls to get all the content for the full game experience.

I don't like how greedy Game Freak has gotten with "Pokémon," but I get that the franchise has gotten so popular where they have to be that way to outsource their assets to other companies. Game Freak gives companies their assets to allow "Pokémon" fans like me to get fun spin-off game experiences.

In short, I may not like the route "Pokémon" games take now and again. It may frustrate me as a long-time fan of the franchise, but I am excited for the release of "Pokémon Brilliant Diamond" and "Pokémon Shining Pearl" on November 19, 2021 on the Nintendo Switch. These games allow me to go full circle and explore my first "Pokémon" region, the Sinnoh region. I am hopeful too that things might change for "Pokémon" in the future.



Comparing the Nintendo Switch (Switch) to the previous long-standing gaming console, the Nintendo 3DS, would not be an equitable match. Throughout the years, Nintendo, the world's largest video game company by revenue, had a few attempts on trying to create the perfect portable gaming console. The closest thing possible to that image was the handheld system, the Nintendo 3DS, but the sales alone were not enough to satisfy the developers. The next attempt was the Nintendo Wii U, which was a bulky handheld remote pad in addition to the console that is connected to the TV; the confluence of issues and technicalities officially made the Wii U Nintendo's worst selling console, with only 13.5 million units sold. The last try was the Switch, a hybrid console that you can port to the TV and take on the go, like the handheld 3DS that came with its own set of problems through the will to make more money with newer mechanics.

The original version of the Switch came out on March 3, 2017, for around \$300. The handheld console is about 4 inches by 9 inches in size, which is two times wider than the Nintendo 3DS and one inch smaller than the Wii U's length and width. Both the Switch and the Wii U have the same screen size, at 6.2 inches, but the Switch isn't as heavy and thick, weighing approximately 0.88 pounds when Joy-Con controllers are attached. Playing active games with motion controls, and weight-lifting an extra pound of plastic, makes a big difference for children and adults alike. In a non-gamer light, just think about the same comparison of heaviness from the original iPhone to the newer models; you shouldn't have to lift weights to call someone on the phone. There is a skinny kickstand on the left corner behind the Switch to prop the console on a table, but with slight movements the kickstand can collapse, causing the standing Switch to fall backwards.

The original version showcased faulty mechanics, such as a fast battery drain, microSD cards being unreadable, defective Joy-Cons that drift or the undetectable Switch Dock, which charges and ports the Switch to the TV.

Out of all the consoles Nintendo has produced, this is the first one that a paid membership is needed to play with friends online. The Switch online subscription is basically Nintendo's replica of Xbox Live, PlayStation Plus, Google's Play Pass, Apple's Apple Arcade and, honestly, the list goes on because paid subscriptions are becoming popular for larger industries. The Switch online includes the ability to play any games that require you to connect to online servers; if only they would mention that majority of the games produced on the Switch incorporate online play to enhance the game's storyline, the gameplay itself or gives necessary perks of being able to connect to the internet for popular games, such as Pokémon Sword and Shield, Splatoon 2 and Animal Crossing New Horizons. More than 4,600 other games are Switch online compatible out of 7,000 listed in the Nintendo game store. The individual membership is \$20 every 12 months, and for the family membership, which can include up to eight Nintendo account holders, it is \$34.99; it is a cheap price for a membership in comparison to other gaming console industries, but is it really necessary? Unlike the companies who make the subscription optional for specific games, Nintendo gives you no other choice but to purchase the ability to access the most crucial parts of gameplay for the majority of the \$60 Switch games in the store.

The Switch online also includes a library of 70 plus classic Super NES and NES games that I have not touched yet, but it is the sole reason why my mom bought her own Switch and membership. A surprising feature that is included in the membership, but not in the overall purchase of the Switch, is the save data cloud. The cloud allows you to back up saved game data; essentially, it is like paying for Google Drive.

Sadly, I am stuck with the superficial hiccups of the original version, until I take the time to contact Nintendo's customer support. My controllers are unusable due to the manufacturing problem, and I refuse to pay \$70 for additional Joy-Cons.

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Wake Up, Sunshine

When the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic first began, I heavily relied on music to keep me calm and balanced.

I was fortunate enough that one of my favorite bands, All Time Low, released a new album, titled "Wake Up, Sunshine", amid the pandemic. These tracks saw me through 4 weeks in quarantine, a rushed remote semester, my return to work and a masked summer.

Now, as we start to take a few tentative steps toward reopening, "Wake Up, Sunshine" continues to provide unique and meaningful tunes. The album's ability to apply to both the hopelessness of the pandemic and the hopefulness of potentially reopening highlights how versatile this compilation truly is.

The first track, "Some Kind of Disaster", was the first to be released in a teaser in late January. The song begins with lead singer, Alex Garaskath's, breathy vocals. The echoing vocals quickly give way to a stronger more upbeat voice, guitar riffs and accompanying beats. Lyrics like "I woke up from a never-ending dream/ I shut my eyes at seventeen," and "You gotta hurt sometimes to learn to heal/ You gotta get back up and learn to deal," make this song memorable and meaningful.

The second song, "Sleeping In", has a calm, yet upbeat style that makes it an immediate favorite. Garaskath's vocals shine here, allowing the band to present a vintage love song with an alternative twist.

The third track, "Getaway Green", also presents a nostalgic style, although it lacks the calmness of the previous track. Steady beats and punk guitar riffs make this song an alternative masterpiece.

The following song, "Melancholy Kaleidoscope", is an enigma. The introductory guitar riff and vocals make listeners expect a fast-paced song. But during the chorus, Garaskath's voice slows and deepens slightly. Later in the song, Garaskath's voice grows even quieter, making the louder moments in the song even more powerful.

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The next track, "Trouble Is...", has a slower beginning, but the chorus is catchy and relatable. Lyrics like "All that I know is I just can't say no to you/ Funny how things never change," are slightly unimaginative, but still meaningful.

The title track, "Wake Up, Sunshine", is one of my personal favorites. The introduction is energetic and lives up to the band's alternative image. Later in the song, Garaskath's vocals slow and grow fainter, highlighting this portion of the track. Lyrics like "Wake up, sunshine/ Somebody loves you for yourself," set this song apart. Overall, this song is inspirational.

The following song, "Monsters", topped Billboard's "Alternative Airplay" chart for weeks, marking the band's first number one song. This track has a heavy alternative style and a fast-paced rap from collaborating artist, blackbear. "Monsters" has become a fan-favorite in every sense of the word.

The next track, "Pretty Venom (Interlude)", marks an interesting change in the band's discography. This song has a slow, acoustic introduction and a slower pace. Garaskath's voice adopts a smooth, echoing and soft tone. Overall, I like "Pretty Venom (Interlude)", but I need to be in a certain mood to listen to it. Considering the rest of the songs on this album, "Pretty Venom (Interlude)" pales in comparison.

"Favorite Place" is the next song on this album. A collaboration with The Band Camino, this track relies on heavy beats to complement Garskath's varied vocals. This song adopts the nostalgic tone seen in earlier tracks, like "Sleeping In."

The following track, "Safe", has a haltering introduction that I dislike. However, the later portion of the song features phenomenal vocals and drum work. Lyrics like "Just put the car in drive/ And chase the county lines/ You'll never know how far you'll go," make this song an instant hit.

The additional songs on this album, "January Gloom (Seasons Pt. 1)", "Clumsy", "Glitter & Crimson", "Summer Daze (Seasons Pt. 2)" and "Basement Noise", are relatively unmemorable, but they carry on the same upbeat drums, powerful vocals and guitar riffs that make "Wake Up, Sunshine" such an extraordinary album.

Overall, this album provided a meaningful distraction both from life at home and from the anxiety of reopening society. Although I do not agree with all the artistic decisions made in this album, I appreciate the final product and the amount of work All Time Low put into it. I would recommend this album to any budding alternative music fan or anyone looking to branch out into new genres.

As I enter the shop, the familiar scent of fresh bread, something cooking on the griddle and coffee flood my senses. Bagel One, a small café right off Summerhill road, is my home away from home, so much so that most of the small staff knows me by name.

A small shop in between the local nail salon and Chinese restaurant, Bagel One invokes the feeling of an old deli or bodega shop. Old subway tile walls and glass display cases make it seem like the shop wouldn't be out of place in the middle of Brooklyn. Small orange wooden booths, pine tables and the ancient cappuccino machine only add to the aesthetic. There is an older television set mounted above the coffee machine, which always plays news or morning talk shows.

The owner, who will often lounge in the booths when not serving customers, alternates between watching these shows and chatting with his regular patrons.

Up until recently, the menu had been displayed in neon writing on a blackboard, surrounded by colorful illustrations of bagels, eggs and sandwiches. Now three new TV's take up space above the register, displaying the same menu the shop has had for as long as I can remember.

As for the food itself, it is a longstanding agreement among my family that they have the best bagels in New Jersey. We get half a dozen for every Mother's Day, Father's Day, birthday or anniversary. I also have an unfortunate habit of stopping in to grab a bagel on my way to classes or work. As a result, I'm at Bagel One at least twice a week.

My favorite item on the menu is the salt bagel with plain cream cheese. Several chain breakfast places, like Dunkin Donuts or Manhattan Bagel, don't offer the classic salt bagel anymore. Bagel One is the only place I know that still serves this staple.

The bagels themselves are perfect; they are never soggy, stale or tough. The cream cheese is always refrigerated and fresh.

The shop offers flavored cream cheeses, like vegetable cream cheese, and additional toppings, like lox. They also specialize in breakfast sandwiches and lunch wraps. My father swears by their pork roll, although I prefer the bacon, egg and cheese on a plain bagel.

The prices are reasonable. A bagel with cream cheese costs about \$2.50, while a breakfast sandwich can cost up to \$5.25. These breakfast sandwiches may cost a little more than similar items at chain breakfast places, but they taste much better.

Since these meals are cooked on the spot, they also tend to take longer than Dunkin Donuts or Manhattan Bagel. I wouldn't recommend ordering a breakfast sandwich if you are in a hurry, but if you have time to spare, they are worth the wait.

While I could probably spend countless hours at Bagel One drinking coffee and doing homework in a booth by the front window, I never do, because there are only a handful of seats. These seats are often occupied by employees from the nearby grocery store or nail salon. The social distancing requirements set due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic have only made finding seating harder. Bagel One has a charming ambience, but I would love to see them add additional seating or expand their business further.

Despite this oversight, I love Bagel One. I recommend this shop to anyone who wants a good, old-fashioned bagel in a fantastic atmosphere.

PlayStation

Sony released the long awaited PlayStation 5 on Thursday, November 12, 2020. A whopping seven years after the release of its predecessor, the Playstation 4 in 2013, it is clear to see why the PS5 is such a step up from the PS4. Aesthetically, the new generation console raised a lot of eyebrows. Playstation decided to sack the primary black color that the PS4 sported, and went with a white casing instead, as well as changing it's accessories from white to black. These accessories include but are not limited to the DualSense wireless controllers, the Pulse 3D wireless headset, and the HD camera. All sporting the new, sleek, white look. There are two versions of the PS5, the digital version and the standard version. I was lucky enough to purchase the digital version of the console on release day. The standard edition costs \$499 plus tax and allows for the ability to insert disks into the console. This means players can buy the game physically and insert them into the console, as well as insert Blu-ray discs into the console to watch movies. On the other hand, the digital edition costs \$399. It does not allow for discs to be inserted, so all games, movies, etc must be downloaded. For \$100 less, you lose the ability to watch Blu-ray movies as well. This for me was not a big deal, so I went for the more affordable option.

The basic digital edition of the Playstation 5 comes with the console itself, a DualSense controller, a stand for the console, and the appropriate wiring needed for installation. Starting with the controller, there is a clear difference compared to the old generation console. Besides the obvious color change, the DualSense controller is a little more sturdy than the PS4's DualShock. It more closely resembles the Xbox controllers which tend to be a little larger, and easier to hold by people with larger hands. This controller is the perfect size, allowing my fingers to reach every button comfortably. The stand is just a simple stand that allows the PS5 to be placed vertically and horizontally.

Now onto the main attraction, the console itself. Coming in at an impressive size, the PS5 is the biggest home console ever made. It's dimensions are 15.4 inches tall, 10.24 inches deep and 4.09 inches wide. Having owned the PS4, one of the blaring issues that Sony faced was the fan inside the console making a lot of noise and struggling to keep the PS4 cool. With the PS5, even the most technologically demanding games don't seem to affect the mechanisms of the console. This is no surprise as the Playstation 5 boasts incredible numbers when it comes to performance, visuals, and all around experience. While the PS4 contained an impressive storage space of 500 gigabytes, the PS5 completely raises the bar, coming with 825GB. After everything is up and running, you are roughly left with around 667GB as some space is needed for the Playstation to run functionally. The PS5, just like the PS4 runs games at 60 frames-persecond quite comfortably. However, Sony has stated that it's next-gen console will support 120 frames-per-second. Such a large boost in framerate only allows the PS5 to break more boundaries when it comes to graphics, experience, and enjoyment. If you are looking for a gaming console that is a decent upgrade from the Playstation 4, runs smoothly, and has incredible graphics, then I highly recommend the Playstation 5.

BTS gifted their fans, army, with an eight-track album titled "BE" on November 20. "BE" has a lowkey and cozy aesthetic that envisions the familiar emotions and lifestyle in the coronavirus pandemic. "Dynamite" was a successful song released back in August, which has intrigued army, music critics and pop-hit listeners upon hearing the group's new album.

The lead single "Life Goes On" has a bittersweet sentiment. The track offers comfort to the listeners living through the pandemic. 

would be lying if I did. She scanned the magazines and stated, "13.98 is your total." Internally, I let out a sigh of relief. All that anxiety for nothing.



I had not broken out of my shell yet before starting to write for Quo Vadis, and I was still mourning my loss, so I didn't know what to do when I first became a part of the newspaper staff.

However, Quo Vadis saved me from myself and my despair as I found the club when I was having suicidal thoughts, and only knew that I had to keep writing to have my voice heard. Being a part of Quo Vadis with a phenomenal staff showed me a brighter future as a journalist. The people behind the paper became my light and gave me the strength to write confidently. However, finding out about my grandfather resurfaced my guilt and regrets.

While writing the Hololive review articles throughout last month, I was able to break free my guilt and fear and decided to go to New York City and Jersey City to be there for my grandparents. My grandfather was having his surgery at a hospital in New York City, and my grandmother was staying at my uncle's condominium in Jersey City.

I spent the last week of March with my grandmother, keeping her company, and going around New York City. I've also been listening to the song "Palette" by Tokoyami Towa to help me cope.

I visited my grandfather in the hospital on March 30th, and I unintentionally got a fever that day. Knowing I was pushing myself so far to be there for my grandparents showed me the passion I never knew had before to be there for others.

After joining Quo Vadis and being there for my grandparents, I finally found myself, which is something I was pondering for years. I used to ask questions such as: do I want to become a journalist or not? Will I accept the struggles as an ally of justice for trying to get my voice and others heard in the future? Will I accept the losses of my loved ones if their deaths ever come my way? I used to say no to all of these questions, but I can finally say yes to them, since I dared to pursue journalism and to help my grandparents.

I know that I want to pursue the path of journalism; I want to travel and see the world, meet new people and have the voices of those unheard be heard. My grandfather got released from the hospital on April 1, and is still recovering from the successful surgery. I know that it will take me a while to develop new ideas and inspiration for future articles I may submit and write, but I know that I won't give up. All I can say to the people reading this is thank you. Thank

you for reading each and every article I've written for Quo Vadis thus far, and I hope you're ready for the future ones I may write.

One year later, I still love watching virtual YouTubers and being a part of the Quo Vadis. Both have kept me sane during these uncertain times of COVID-19.


Teacher Appreciation



Russian skater Kamila Valieva is allowed to compete at the Winter 2022 Olympics even though she tested positive for a banned heart drug back in December.

This is a very controversial situation.

Valieva is a 15-year-old girl competing for Russia with one of the most brutal coaches, Eteri Tutberidze. Of course, if her coach told her to take a drug, she wouldn't go against her coach or county. I never really liked Christmas to




Spotswood resident, Connor Jaedicke, said "They [the churches] are very historical. I've worked on some areas nearby, and they're always being improved."



Pharmacy

Owner

For 15 years, Anil Datwani has been running the Ar-Ex Pharmacy in Fords, New Jersey. He is the fifth owner of this pharmacy, which has been serving patients since 1950.

Before owning this pharmacy, he worked as a pharmacy technician, and he was a pharmaceutical major in college.

"My first job was at Burger King, and I was declared as the employee of the month after my second month of working there. Soon, I became the manager of the store. From that, I came to know that I have qualities of hardworking and leadership," said Anil.

Anil said, "Medicine is my passion, and I wanted to make my career in that."

This year, COVID-19 became a threat to every country. In early March, Gov. Phil Murphy announced a stay at home order and declared New Jersey's public health emergency. Anil has never faced a situation like this before in the 15 years of owning the pharmacy. It was difficult for him to handle his pharmacy during the time of lockdown and when every nonessential business was shut down. We conducted the interview in his office; I was nervous because my boss and I were taking his interview, but Anil made me feel comfortable during the interview.

Anil said, "There were a lot of angry people who did not accept the closing of small nonessential businesses, and I knew that I have to do crowd control by that point of time. So, we started curbside pickup."

He started telling me the stories of the customers complaining about coming inside the store to shop. I also started thinking about the same thing, as I was working on those days. He shared a couple of stories, and we both had a pleasant smile on our faces, as we both knew that the customers were making a big deal about almost nothing.

"We decided to do curbside pickup for their (customer) and our safety purposes only," he said.

He explained how busy the pharmacy was, but the business was not doing well. He had cut down his regular hours and opened the pharmacy for just 9 hours a day and 6 hours on the weekends. There was a shortage of inventories. Due to curbside pickup, the busi-

ness/profit that he was receiving over the counter was zero.

He said, "I was also struggling wealth wise. I had to pay payroll to my employees and also try to pay my suppliers. I was getting items like PPE (personal protective equipment) and plexiglass for safety purposes which cost me more money."

On the other side, sales were going low as the patients were not going to the doctor and getting enough prescriptions filled.

He said, "There was a significant drop in our business, as people were scared to buy or even touch the products. Daily things like newspapers, lottery tickets and milk selling counts were zero, and there was fear of getting this virus by buying this product in our customers."

Lastly, he proudly said that the employees working at the pharmacy with me during that time worked as they were working in their own store, not as employees. They all worked every day for eight to nine hours straight without any breaks and tried to serve our community with the best service.

He said, "There were some employees that did not want to work, as everyone has their own situation, and some wanted to collect their unemployment. Though, there were some of my core employees who understood what I was going through and caring for the pharmacy. They also had the mentality of 'keep going and serving our patients no matter what happens."

He felt proud of his staff, who he saw as heroes as they cared for his store. They dealt with arguments with people who had COVID-19 as they were also coming to pick up medication sometimes, and 85% of his staff did a great job.

At last, he gave the information knowing about this virus spread throughout this country. Since January, he knew that this virus would be a big problem, as he was constantly looking at the number of cases that were increasing in China.

He said, "I believe that the spreading of this virus happened after the Chinese New Year, as millions of Chinese tourists visited New York City at that time, and it became an epicenter for spreading this virus in America."

As the interview concluded, there was a moment of silence in the room as we both started thinking about this deadly virus. We both prayed and hoped that America and the rest of the world would be in a better place soon.

O'Sullivan

"Writing is like my refuge," said Brian O'Sullivan, a successful self-published author from the San Francisco Bay Area. Being underrepresented as a Hollywood screenwriter did not stop O'Sullivan from leaving his mark on the world.

He was a college student at the University of California, Santa Barbara, unsure of what career path he wanted to pursue and facing a slight distraction from the endless options of entertainment within the city.

Brian said, "I often think, what if I started writing novels then? I am in my 40s now and I could have 30 novels if I really started at 21."

As a college student myself, I found that having the passion to write is on an odd level with having the discipline to commit, especially through something so tedious as writing a book. Self-publishing is a reachable goal for college students or anyone who wants to get their voice out.

O'Sullivan's failure to sell his screenplays did not discourage him from finding a way to do what he loves.

He said, "I was probably one of a million. We had local bars we would go to and the waiters, wait-resses and the bartenders were all either trying to become actors or had written something."

"So, I decided to write a novel knowing that, you know, people buy novels. People don't buy screen-plays. You have to get hired by a production company, Hollywood. There's a long, long process. And so I started writing my first book about seven or eight years ago. I finished it, but I didn't think it was quite good enough," said Brian.

O'Sullivan said he never published his first book, but his political disposition during the 2016 presidential campaign was a successful idea for a novel.

O'Sullivan said, "When Trump started running, I started writing a novel and it kind of just went the way of becoming a political novel and stuff. I finished that one in 2016, and it was released then."

"The Puppeteer," is a political thriller about Frankie and Evie, two down-to-earth young adults, who, on a search to uncover a mystery, stumble across the dark side of politics, murder and mayhem. It was the start to O'Sullivan's suspenseful novels, as his second novel, "The Patsy" was a sequel with

the same hair-raising vibrato.

He became his own publisher on Amazon, after a long battle to find a literary agent.

O'Sullivan has a following of almost 100,000 followers on Twitter, and when I received a message from him promoting a book that I would read, I felt pretty good that he at least read my Twitter bio to come to this conclusion.

"When I decided to self-publish, I knew that I was going to have to be my own marketer and promoter. I mean, I send out probably 200 of those direct messages a day with links to the novel. I've got like 50 ads right now through Amazon that if you go to Amazon, you're looking for books that are similar to mine. I have to pay per click, and then if people click on it and buy, I get paid," said

O'Sullivan. Be-

coming a self-published author was a challenge for O'Sullivan, but knowing what his goals were led him to succeed in this competitive atmosphere.

O'Sullivan said, "It's almost like running a full-on business. It's not just writing. So in that regard, I wish I had a publisher, but unless you're like Christian or Stephen King it is tough to get a publisher these days. and they actually take a high percentage. I get

of every sale from Amazon. You get like 10% of every sale if you have a publisher. Now, they can get you in The New York Times, at the front of Barnes and Noble and stuff. There are obviously advantages, but just per sale and stuff, you make more publishing."

His determination showed through his five-star thriller novels on Amazon.

"Now, I am about to finish up my fifth novel and I'm pretty successful for a self-published

author. I'm not Stephen King, I'm not John Grisham ... but there's a million different ways to advertise for a first published author these days, obviously. Follow me on Twitter, and I have a big following," he said.

Recollection

Robert Hoffman worked at Thomson Reuters Corporation in New York during 2001, right across from the World Trade Center's Twin Towers.

Living in New Jersey, Hoffman would travel on the NJ Transit then transfer onto the PATH to get to his office.

Sept. 11, the PATH Hoffman took got diverted north of the World Financial Center without any reason why.

When the PATH doors opened, a guy came running and screamed, "Everybody get out! They hit the towers!" This announcement caused everyone who got off the PATH to look up and see the World Trade Center's North Tower smoking.

At first, Hoffman didn't realize what happened, so he started walking toward his office until he saw the second plane hit the World Trade Center's South Tower. At this moment, he knew they were under attack.

"A lot goes through your mind when you see something like this, especially since I previously worked at the South Tower. A part of you wants to leave and take safety, and then another part of you wants to help where you can," said Hoffman.

Hoffman and some other civilians were scrambling to see what they could do to help. It wasn't until they talked to a fireman did they realize most of them were in the way and needed to let the professionals do their job.

Once they started walking away to let the firemen rescue people, the South Tower came down. A huge plume of smoke came down the street that looked like an Egyptian biblical sandstorm.

Hoffman had friends in the city who owned a catering company. On his way there, most of the streets became empty and reminded him of a post-apocalyptic movie. Everything was grey with ash. People were in a rush to get inside where it would be safe from the smoke. On his way to the catering company, Hoffman tripped over a person's shoe that was left on the street.

While being outside, Hoffman saw people jumping out of the

towers to die rather than burn to death.

After a while, Hoffman made his way up north to the Hudson Street satellite office who kept people there to be safe. Because of the attack, most cell towers were down, so he borrowed someone's cell phone to call his wife.

The satellite office fed everybody inside and gave them water while New York was shut down. The tunnels, subway and trains were all down to prevent anyone from traveling. No one knew if that was going to be the last attack or not, so Hoffman had to wait for New York to reopen before being able to go home.

Once the city reopened, Hoffman took a subway to New York Penn train station to get back to his family. It was such a traumatic day; no one cared if people had train tickets or not. They just let him on the train to get out of the city. Once he was back in New Jersey, Hoffman shared a cab with four people to get to where he parked his car.

"Once I got back to New Jersey, there were kids playing in parks as if nothing happened. Not a lot of people worked in the city and everything seemed normal back here."

Hoffman still had ash, soot and dust in the clothes he was wearing.

His entire company was off the next day, but when he finally went back into the city, there was an enormous pile of pieces from the tower. When Hoffman went into his office to get his laptop, the windows were smashed and the office was covered in soot.

"It destroyed a lot of things aside from the city I love; it destroyed a sense of security, a lot was taken away from that day. I have a burnt piece of paper from that day to remember the people we lost," Hoffman said.

His company lost 10 people - some were in their location in the tower and some were on the plane that got hijacked. Hoffman is still on anxiety medications because of PTSD from that day.

Dr. Penelope Lattimer finished high school in Red Bank, NJ, just in time for the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to become law.

Dr. Lattimer was 13-years-old when the Civil Rights Movement was in full swing in 1960, a 16-year-old senior in high school when the March on Washington occurred and graduated high school about a month before the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was signed. The Civil Rights Act of 1964 was signed that July.

She looked like the perfect student as she sat behind her desk with her hands folded in front of her on her desk and her back straight. Her posture gave insight to what kind of student she was. She obtained her B.A. in French and M.A. in Student Personnel Services from Montclair State.

Her first job was as an Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF) counselor at Montclair State University in 1967. She became the Assistant Director of EOF for two years at Georgian Court University. There, she was counselor to 10 Black girls and eventually Dr. Lattimer became the counselor to all 12 Black students

at 20-years-old.

In 1968, student uprisings on college campuses made its way to New Jersey. "The campuses, they had to go through an adjustment because most of these campuses, Montclair included, and certainly Georgian Court, are the ones I knew the best, they had never had so many students of color on campus. And so, both sides had to adjust," she said. "In places like Montclair, you had a little more aggression going on where there was a challenge to establish Black Student Unions. That was pretty normal across the United States, this emphasis on wanting Black Student Unions, wanting to have more Black professors, more Black dorms, more Black floors in dormitories, those kinds of challenges. Also, of course, this is the time when Black students at Rutgers, Montclair, and all the state schools for sure, and places like Georgian Court, were asking for Black literature. This is the time where Nikki Giovanni, Toni Cade Bambara, Sonia Sanchez, these women in particular, and others were gaining prominence," said Penelope.

Black students wanted to study Black literature. She listed names like Richard Wright, Langston Hughes, and turned to her bookcase, which looked like it couldn't fit one more book and gave the name Ralph Ellison. She said she encourages Black students to be more willing to study a world language.

"It makes you so much more marketable, and it makes you more sensitive when you're studying another group's culture and language," said Penelope.

Her parents were active members in their local branch of the NAACP chapter and her mother, also an educator, made sure Penelope and her siblings understood what was happening. "My mother (who taught American History and Civics) REQUIRED my brother and myself to read the daily newspaper reports as well as historical accounts and biographies of the leaders of the Movement - people such as Bayard Rustin, John Hope Franklin, Samuel DeWitt Proctor, Shirley Chisholm and others ... more than simply reading about Martin Luther King, Jr."

Dr. Lattimer received her Ph.D. in Education from Union Graduate School in Cincinnati, Ohio in 1975 at the age of 25. In 1974, she designed and was the first director of the Gibbons School, a demonstration high school, at Rutgers University.

Today, she's a retired educator and is currently the president of the board for George Street Playhouse, a professional, regional theater in New Brunswick, New Jersey. She's currently working on promoting Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) within the organization.

Penelope sat at her desk and reflected on her experiences. "The Civil Rights Era, as we see from the tributes to current events, was a time of awakening to our nation, and of a time when new legislation was adopted in order to address inequities in our society, and unfortunately those inequities required renewed attention today

because we see where we did not complete
the task. Our society still struggles with
accepting diversity and inclusion of
people of color as decision-makers
in their own lives and the legislative records that impact on the
lives of all Americans."

Scibetta

It was December of 1995 when Michael Scibetta was visiting the Magic Kingdom with his wife for Mickey's Very Merry Christmas Party.

The couple was sitting in traffic waiting to get into the park when Scibetta's wife suggested an extraordinary idea that changed his life forever.

She asked him, "Why don't you just get a part-time job here? You've always worked part-time jobs."

Coincidentally, it was the same morning before his wife unveiled this proposal that Scibetta found an advertisement in the weekend section of the "Orlando Sentinel." Disney was opening a new place called the "Disney Institute" and was looking to hire people to be ushers for performances.

Scibetta pointed out that the "Disney Institute was not what it is today. It was a resort that was turned into a teaching facility for guests. The idea was that they would have classes during the day: cooking classes, animation classes, history of animation classes, all different classes that a guest can take (...) and at night, Disney was going to have performances of some sort."

Scibetta and his wife originally moved to Florida on August 1, 1993, due to his job transferring him from Edison, New Jersey, to Orlando. The couple rented a house just five miles away from Disney.

Scibetta described how they lived "so close [to Disney] that when they walked the dog at night, [they] could hear the train whistle [and] the fireworks."

It was during this period that he fell in love with Disney World.

The hiring process for Disney is much different than any other amusement park. Scibetta explained that his resume to work as an

usher had to go through the entertainment department. Despite the intensity of the hiring process, Scibetta was one of the first seven ushers to be hired to work at Disney's newest attraction.

He began working part-time at Disney on January 2, 1996.

"It was a great experience, but it was not successful. We found that anybody who attended it [and] tried it, loved it, but it was that hurdle of getting people to try something different and not go to the parks," Scibetta said regarding his experience at the Disney Institute.

During our interview, Scibetta went on to illustrate how the institute would be so empty during their evening performances that he would bring in his family members to fill seats. The fewer people that would come, the fewer hours cast members were offered to work.

In December of 1998, Scibetta was offered another part-time job at Disney as a host at Yachtsman Steakhouse. He worked both part-time jobs and his full-time job simultaneously up until the Disney Institute eventually closed its doors. His fellow cast members from the institute ended up working in Epcot as "people who hold the flashlights."

Lucky for Scibetta, the manager at the Yachtsman Steakhouse helped him work his way up the ranks at the restaurant and kept him working there for eight years. However, Scibetta's hours started being reduced as a result of the effects related to 9/11.

"I worked that night, and I worked that following weekend, and of course, there were a lot of people in Florida that couldn't get back home because the planes weren't flying. (...) Basically, after that weekend, because I was part-time, I no longer got any hours," Scibetta recounted.

He was unable to work at Disney for two months after 9/11 occurred, but continued to work his full-time job during that period.

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He said, "I was going crazy. I was at home missing Disney. I would call and say, 'You're sure you don't need me this weekend?'"

Fast-forward to the weekend after Thanksgiving in 2001, Sciebtta's daughter, also a Disney cast member who worked as a coordinator at Wilderness Lodge, calls her dad midafternoon:

"Dad, what are you doing? I need a big favor. I need you to come in and drive a fireworks cruise. (...) They're easy to do. It's a pontoon boat. They're very easy to drive. Can you help me out?"

Scibetta was taught how to drive the pontoon boat really quickly. He then took his assigned family out for their Magic Kingdom fireworks cruise and discovered that he really enjoyed doing it. He loved it so much that he had his daughter put his name on the list of people who could do the cruises when needed.

He did fireworks cruises on-and-off for a while, and after about eight months of learning his ways, he began training another cast member, who worked Epcot, to do the cruises for the Magic Kingdom fireworks out of Wilderness Lodge.

The cast member he was training recognized how well Scibetta ran his cruises. Consequently, the cast member from the other park offered Scibetta a position driving another boat for guests to see Epcot's fireworks show, "Illuminations."

Scibetta mentioned excitedly, "I was doing fireworks cruises for the Magic Kingdom, [cruises] for Epcot's 'Illuminations', and working [at] Yachtsman Steakhouse all at the same time, and having a blast doing it."

Eventually, Scibetta ended up leaving his job at the Yachtsman Steakhouse. Shortly after, he had yet another job offer, this one a bigger deal than all the rest prior to this request: "Hey Mike, how would you like to learn how to drive Breathless?"

For those who don't know, Breathless was a 27-foot Chris Craft wooden boat replica made around the 1930s. The boat was made of mahogany wood, had a huge engine and was used for tours, fireworks cruises, and occasional speedy joyrides. Disney bought one of the 18 Chris Craft Company speed boat replicas that were created strictly because they knew the boat would fit in with the theme of the Yacht and Beach Club Resort. The boat has since been retired, and has been replaced with what is known as "Breathless II."

Breathless II is a 37-foot hacker craft. It is a faster boat and it has a bigger engine than Breathless.

"There came a point in time where I was the driver of [Breathless] every Sunday. I had it from 2 o'clock to 10:30 at night. I had an eight-hour shift, and it was heaven," expressed Scibetta.

Scibetta also mentioned that he was one of the few people who got to drive Breathless and Breathless II.

Unfortunately, it was during all these promotions as a part-time worker at Disney World that Scibetta was laid off from his full-time job of 32 years. He said it was a horrible time in his life; he lost his full-time job right before Thanksgiving and continued to be unemployed in a full-time job come Christmas time.

Scibetta recalled, "I said to my wife, 'Don't worry, honey. I've been in the industry for 32 years. I shouldn't have a problem finding another job.' Boy, was I wrong; it was a whole different world. (...) Back in the day, whenever you would look for a job, you open up the newspaper and circled a few things. You made a few phone calls, you took a few interviews, and you were working the following week. In this day and age, everything's online, and no one wants to talk to you. You don't get the opportunity to go face-to-face or even talk to anybody. It's horrible."

Once again, Scibetta's wife made a helpful suggestion: "Why don't you see what Disney has to offer?"

Scibetta understood that the pay would not be great, but the benefits would be if he could secure a full-time job in Disney World on top of his part-time gigs.

While celebrating his 15 years at Disney, he asked the resort manager at the Yacht Club if she could help him get a full-time job working the front desk. Being employed for 15 years is considered a big deal, especially for cast members at Disney. The resort manager told Scibetta to consider it done.

Long story short, Scibetta worked his way up the ranks in his fulltime Disney job as well. He recently retired from working in Club Level Concierge at Disney's BoardWalk Inn on this special date: the anniversary of the Magic Kingdom and Epcot Center.

Scibetta said, "[Disney is] a great place to work, except you basically have to start at the bottom. (...) If you stick around and work hard to move up, you will succeed."

While Sciebtta's ideology is great advice to those interested in working the magic that takes place behind the scenes, his message also resonates with one of Walt Disney's most famous quotes: "Keep moving forward." It would appear that Scibetta gets it.

"I always had an interest in sketching and drawing things," Madelene Hatt, born Madelene Milo, begins, settling more comfortably on the chocolate-colored leather coach in the center of the room, "In junior high school, they made me do all the backgrounds for the plays."

Surrounded by replications of renaissance paintings, dark wood, muted hardcover books, ornate picture frames and intricately patterned furniture, Hatt does not look out of place amid the baroque décor. Her neat bob, pressed clothes and streamlined posture fit in well with the environment and with her carefully cultivated image as a cultured and intelligent member of the fashion industry.

"I started doing sketching of (things) from the New York Times. They used to have charcoal and pen and ink fashion models, all with beautiful poses and beautiful clothes back in the day. So, I started duplicating theirs," Hatt says, a smile gracing her face as she recalls the illustrations she loved so dearly.

Growing up in Brooklyn in the 1950s, Hatt attended public school for the first decade of her life. When she reached high school, she applied and was accepted to the Art and Design High School. Even though this event occurred almost 50 years ago, Hatt still recounts the memory of her acceptance with a tinge of pride.

After a promising career at the Art and Design High School, Hatt decided to apply to the Fashion Institute of Technology (FIT). Her work was promising enough for her to secure both an acceptance and a scholarship to the prestigious school.

"FIT, at that point, was academics first," Hatt revealed, "And then art classes. I had textile design, some architectural classes, teaching us how to use a slide rule, which is absolutely obsolete now."

Hatt smirks conspiratorially after the last part of her statement, almost as if we are sharing a secret about how much the world has changed since her time in college.

"I took fashion illustration, which was the sketching of the fashion models. Then I took textile design because that was related to fashion design versus fashion illustration. I took draping classes and stuff. So, they taught you how to make a pattern....They taught you then, from that, how to make your muslin master plan, up from the paper pattern to the muslin. And then you use that on those mannequins," Hatt explains, "At the end of whatever that class was, your teacher would come in, and they would check your original design, like what did you want to do? I made a cape that would be [made] of, let's say, a tweed with suede trim. Whatever the design was, they would compare it and how you made it reality."

Hatt said that after her stint at FIT, she planned to become a designer.

"I took my sketches and made my portfolio, what my ideas were, and I pounded the street, which was Manhattan's 14 or seven Broadway 1411. Those big buildings had all of the major companies that mass-produced clothing, you know like Levi's," Hatt states, "I would walk in and meet the people that were involved in the designing sector... I would show them my designs or whatever, and some people would want to buy this concept from me."

Eventually, Hatt left designing and became an assistant to a buyer within the industry. She worked with Peck & Peck, a company like Sacs Fifth Avenue.

"I would make the appointments with the houses that she [the buyer] would go to. And now I was on the other side [of the industry]. Basically, the buyer and assistant would go to, let's say Ellen Tracy or whatever. And we walk in, and they would sit us down, and they would show us the designs, that maybe originally I had brought them, and that they were interpreted," Hatt explains.

"The buyer that I was with...she would explain a lot of things to me like, 'This is very beautiful but I don't think we could sell it...but this is a knockoff of that, and it has less detail and a little less labor, so this is less money. Let's buy 100 of these and put one or two in the top stores to see how they go. And if it goes, we'll order more of them.' And that's how I learned that procedure," she says.

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Hatt later became a buyer in her own right. Upon announcing this proudly, Hatt rises from the sofa and heads toward a desk in the adjoining room. She searches for the article written about her promotion in Peck & Peck's newspaper, "Women's Wear Daily".

Although she doesn't find it, we end up perusing photographs from her various vacations, family events and adventures. Hatt grins and laughs as she scrutinizes the faded prints that depict her unique life.

Lorraine was able to become a member of the government-run association under her father, Loren Hummell's name as he was an infantry soldier in War World II.


"They only recruited people who have personally been in a war overseas or had a family member enlisted in one," said Lorraine.

Upon joining, Lorraine started to work her way through the chairs, or positions, in the local organization. She quickly went from being a guard for the door during meetings to a trustee and then onto a secretary.

Finally, in the spring of 1971, she was able to secure the coveted spot of president at her local post in Sayreville and was put in charge of a committee of 150 or more women, at the young age of 21. Some of the duties that came with the position were visiting veteran hospitals, organizing events for clubs such as Girl Scouts, and keeping fellow members up to date on issues or affairs.

Although it was a lot to handle, Lorraine was overjoyed knowing she would lead her fellow members to success.

After about a year of being in a leadership position at Sayreville Post 4699, she decided to give it up, but was still very active as a member.



"I participated in all different kinds of services and programs including veteran's day, Memorial Day, and POW/MIA events the organization holds every year," said Lorraine.

With the help of the organization, she has also given care packages to soldiers which include deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, and soap.

As she explained to me all the different programs that aid veterans, soldiers, and their families; I wondered if many people had heard about these opportunities. I know that any time I mention services related to veterans, nobody seems to know about them.

"A lot of these veterans don't know a lot of this stuff is here for them because nobody is handing it out," said Lorraine. "I give pamphlets to schools to hand out to the children, and they don't pass them out."

I hear the sorrow in her voice as she recollects the various veterans, she has encountered that did not get the respect and help that they deserve. It hurts to know that there are so many that get disregarded after coming home from battle, permanently scarred. I, too, have witnessed many veterans and soldiers struggle to make ends meet as well as get disrespected, and it is awful.

"I think we should take care of the people who are trying to keep us free and do the best we can for them because soldiers sacrifice their lives and their homes for us," said Lorraine.

In the year 2000, at the age of 52, Lorraine was reinstated as the president of the Sayreville post and spent the next ten years devoted to leading her members in aiding veterans and soldiers of foreign wars. She even inducted many members of her family, including her sister, children, nieces, and nephews.

"My kids, basically, grew up in Wildwood because I went to the big convention the organization holds in June, every year," Lorraine said.

This convention lasts about two to three days, and each post in New Jersey is expected to attend. At this convention, the posts can win prizes for categories such as top 10 presidents and best poppy display, which showcases the signature flower of the veterans. Lorraine has won 20 awards in her time as a member; she even won

first place in the top 10 presidents' category.

In recent years, she had become the district president which meant she held authority over 26 different posts located throughout New Jersey. However, she has since retired from that position.

Lorraine, being 71 this year, still actively attends meetings and participates in programs. She is still just as dedicated as when she first started, maybe even more.

After she described all that she had done, with this organization, to aid the veterans and soldiers; I wondered what made her continue to do it.

"I do it because my Dad was in the service and because I like helping the veterans in any way I can, since they sacrifice so much for us." said Lorraine.

She showed me a black and white picture of her father Loren Hummell, at 15-years-old, dressed in his WWII uniform. She explained to me that he had forged his documents to enlist early.

As she showed me some more information on the organization, including pamphlets, program sheets, and the history of the association printed out; I reflected on what I had done to help those in need. Although I have done a few things in my life to aid the less fortunate; I can't say that I have devoted my life to it. More importantly, I cannot remember the last time I thanked a veteran, let alone helped one.



"Caprice," a voice echoed in the abyss. The voice became more apparent, and a symphony of heated exchanges between the persons became present and clearer, as I can make out some of it. "Successful... Tylenol after a craniotomy? ... Morphine... She is waking up now!" My response never left my lips, and a bulge down my esophagus became present to my senses, and I started to gag. Agony is what I felt as I came out of my altered state; the bleak vibrations turned into a constant feeling of a hammer slamming into my skull. The pain was unbearable. A burning sensation shot down my right arm, and after a few seconds, I was at peace; the darkness came back. I was alone.

I woke up in a hospital bed, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit (PICU) room 1. My mind was still there as I was able to read the bolded black letters above the television at a slant; my body was laid on a 150-degree angle. From the corner of my left eye, I was able to see a distorted view of my mother, grandmother and my math home-instruction teacher. I was homeschooled for almost three years; the familiar faces kept me

The tube was removed, but my throat felt like nails scratching from the inside. In reaction to their presence I tried to speak. A raspy sound filtered through my lips, but not a coherent word was said. As I tried to open my mouth more to annunciate, my jaw stopped widening and pain stretched across my temples as I tried to pry my mouth open by force. My jaw was locked; the muscle was tight. The second reaction toward seeing my family was to see them fully. I raised my head from the bed abruptly and immediately felt the world spinning around me. Darkness surrounded me again, but the dizziness, stiffness and pain were still present.

After two weeks of searching to find a source of my two years' worth of insufferable headaches, dizziness and nausea, as an effect of a traumatic brain injury that refused to heal, I was given a choice that would change my life forever: the minimally invasive procedure, with a high chance of completely losing the hearing in my left ear; or, a Middle Fossa Craniotomy, the total repairment of the bone in my semicircular canal through brain surgery.
