
academic year.


Breen, Reger, Roach, & Smith take honors

MCC's water slightly leaded but still safe

For the past two years, Raritan Hall has had signs posted that instruct teachers and students to drink the water at their own risk. Rumors from students and faculty members claiming that the the water is either poisonous or contaminated with lead have plagued the campus, causing fear and worry.

Ann McLane, coordinator of Safety, said that there is nothing to worry about, however. She declared that the water is not poisoned nor contaminated, but it does have a slightly high lead indication.

She said, "After numerous tests, the water in Raritan Hall came out one point above the state cut-off level for the amount of lead permissible. We have been flushing the water, both in Raritan and Edison Halls, which has proven to be successful in the efforts to remove the lead."

McLane assured that the water in both buildings is still being tested, and that there is no cause for alarm. She believes that the issue was blown out of proportion.

Because the college does not have its own reservoir or water facility, MCC's water is pumped from Edison Township's water company. McLane said that she does not know if the source of the lead problem is the pipes at MCC or the Township of Edison's underground city pipes. According to McLane, that is why all necessary precautions are being taken to correct this minor problem.

Counselors in the Department of Counseling and Placement Services are ready to help students adjust to college life and find part-time jobs.

One of the department's counselors, Terri Orosz, helps many students in these types of situations.

"Lots of students come in to see me, and say they are looking for part-time work. I meet

with them and discuss exactly how job placement works," explained Orosz.

V.P. Bakum discusses MCC issues

Dr. John Bakum has been a vice-president at MCC for 12 years, and has worked as a staff member for 28 years.

Bakum is a graduate of Orange County Community College, Newark College of Engineering, and Rutgers the State University of New Jersey. His degree is in electrical engineering, with a doctorate in education. Bakum is presently teaching an Algebra II class on campus as well as visiting other colleges to discuss administrative matters.

When asked what future projects are planned for MCC. Bakum replied, "A Learning Resource Center which will be constructed in the near future willconnect the present library with the Johnson Learning Center through glass breezeways and bridges. This new facility will allow students to grow through learning, and the college to meet today's present standards."

One of the most memorable and gratifying events that Bakum has experienced at MCC was the

other accredited educational in-

implementation of a dual degree program with Rutgers University. Four years ago, Rutgers University agreed to accept MCC transfer students who have fulfilled the requirements of the fine, practical, or performing academic arts and who have shown outstanding academic performance.

Since this agreement, many

stitutions have also honored transfer pupils from MCC.

A forthcoming academic program, according to Bakum, will be the addition of Russian as a new foreign language. Russian classes will begin in the spring or fall of the 1995 academic year.


When questioned about security on campus, Dr. Bakum replied, "Compared to other higher level schools, Middlesex County College has a 24 hour police force and eight new yellow emergency phones are being posted on campus for additional security. We have the campus well covered."

In the future, MCC will be receiving over one million dollars worth of state-of-the-art equipment, including computers, robotic machinery, and audio/ visiual aids. The State of New Jersey will pay 75 percent of the funding; 25 percent will be paid back by the college through leasing programs.

"There is a high possibility of a new parking area behind Raritan and L'Hommedieu Halls. The overflow of over 12,000 students on campus everyday has created the need for more parking for students as well as teachers," said Bakum.

Bacums motto is "Work on something, and have it accomplished."

MCC Chief carries on tradition

Chief Oberc is sitting at his desk, going about his daily work. A loud crash sounds through the office. Oberc runs outside to see an accident. His day has begun.

Being Chief of Police at MCC brings about certain responsibilities. Oberc is responsible for the college's safety and security programs, the investigation of criminal acts, and the overall supervision of the police department. It is a lot of work, but he is happy doing it.

"I enjoy coming to work every day. I have a ball here," said Oberc. He is the third chief in MCC's Police Department history. He explained that he wants to maintain the department's integrity and carry on traditions from former chiefs.

"There is always the potential for danger on this job. Dangers faced on the outside are also capable of occurring on campus," said Oberc.

In past years, weapons have been confiscated after isolated altercations. "Kids are coming here from high school where weaponry is a problem," he noted.

Oberc has seen many accidents, fights, and criminal acts during his seventeen-year term at the department. He told of one unique incident during the Indian Festival in 1991. On the last day of the festival, forty daggercarrying members of a religious sect soothed her with his words and reassured her that everything would be alright. "It felt really



Live CD's from overseas costly but worth it

Are you disappointed with the fact that you can only obtain the works of your favorite artists at Sam Goody and The Wiz? Are you disappointed that it seems like the only way you can hear your favorite bands perform live is if you attend their concerts?

Many bands release live material overseas. For a long time, these CD's were unavailable to the American public, and bootleg tapes were floating around. However, chances are that the recordings were poor due to the fact that the performances were taped illegally. People would spend big money to hear their favorite bands live, and get ripped off instead.

Finally, there is a solution to this problem. There are certain stores in the Tri-State area that carry overseas albums. The US #1 Flea Market carries a few, but they are overpriced. Revolver Records, located at 45 West 8th Street in New York City, carries these CD's for twenty dollars each. This is cheap compared to US #1's price of thirty dollars.

While twenty dollars for one CD may seem expensive, one has to take into consideration that these CD's are being shipped from overseas, and can not be purchased in America's corporate record stores.

Practically any popular band that has gotten at least some radio airplay has released one of these CD's. Artists include Guns-N-Roses, Nine Inch Nails, U2, Prince, the Black Crowes, Metallica, Morissey, Jane's Addiction, Ministry, Nirvana, Madonna, The Lemon Heads, Smashing Pumpkins, Led Zepplin, Kiss, Rage Against the Machine, and Soundgarden. And all of them are live!


Again, these albums are NOT

bootlegs. They were recorded directly off the mixing board, which means NO STATIC!!!

Often, countries overseas have material long before it is released in America. For example, Nirvana's MTV Unplugged performance, which is scheduled for release in America on N c vember 1, arrived at Revolve Records (from Italy) this summer.

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Cornwell's "The Body Farm" is a murderous, masterful mystery

"Who knows what evil lurks in the heart of men..." or women for that matter? That is the ominous message in the riveting and gruesome book The Body Farm, which recently reached number four on the USA Today Best Seller List.

Award-winning crime reporter and author Patricia D. Cornwell has written a trilogy of unusual murder investigations: Post Mortem, Cruel and Unusual, and All That Remains. Her novels revolve around the career of fictional forensic pathologist and FBI consultant Dr. Kay Scarpetta.

I have to confess, I have been unable to stop reading these pageturners, and I enjoy each grisly, sickening detail that Scarpetta's investigative autopsies uncover.

Cornwell's characters and her murderous tales exploit that insane need to understand the diabolical mind that lies in all of us. In her fourth novel of this series, Cornwell unleashes Scarpetta on the trail of the fascinating and gruesome murder of a little girl in North Carolina. Scarpetta, teamed with FBI colleagues Benton Wesley and Pete Marino, arrives in the peaceful mountains of Asheville to untangle a botched police investigation and a murder which smacks of "serialism".

Is this hideous and perverted crime the evil handiwork of the elusive killer Temple Gault? With increasing trepidation and no time to waste, Scarpetta consults "The Body Farm", a secret FBI research facility in Tennessee that specializes in forensic tricks of the trade.


In this book, Cornwell fleshes out the characters of Scarpetta, Wesley, and Marino, and allows the reader glimpses into the hearts of these dedicated professionals.

Not for the squeamish or the faint of heart, The Body Farm is a chilling and riveting tale. Once again, Cornwell has scored with Dr. Kay Scarpetta, an intelligent and gutsy investigator who pursues truth and justice "from the inside out."




Patricia Cornwell: author of many murder stories as she appears on the cover of her latest novel.


