MCC will head a consortium of community and state colleges, including Raritan Valley, Morris, Mercer, and Essex county colleges, as well as the New Jersey Institute of Technology and Trenton State College, to investigate and propose an innovative method of technological education.

"Teams of students will have the opportunity to develop these skills while working on simulated real life projects, just like those encountered in the industrial fields daily," Rubino added.

According to Rubino, if the concept of a "Center of Excellence" is successful, MCC will receive up to five million dollars over the next

MCC Awarded \$50,000 NSF Grant

According to Professor Frank J. Rbino, the MCC consortium members have been meeting with state high school and college instructors, as well as major industry professionals, to assess the needs of students entering the different technological fields.

Based on the information gathered, the committee is developing a plan for a unique "project oriented" curriculum.

Courses will be offered which

emphasize problem solving skills within a real work, real life scenario.

Rubino stated, "Industry is now looking for a blended, more multi-faceted technician, rather than the specialized five years to implement the program. He hopes to see a technological center, which uses input from both faculty nd industrial leaders, at MCC within that time frame.

Because of the ventilation system, the smoke managed to fill part of the first floor and the second floor in the building.



"The Journalism Workshop course is offered to all students as a liberal arts elective towards graduation," said Jim Bernarducci, English professor and newspaper advisor.

"The class combines many elements of newspaper production by using desktop publishing applications including Pagemaker and other software packages. All interested students should contact the English department for information about requirements for registration."

"The paper production includes more than just writing. We have to keep in contact with our advertisers as well as college staff to produce a regular and timely paper," stated Business Manager Douglas Wilson. "Students who wish to write or help with other office duties are encouraged to contact any of ther editors during working hours.

Introduction to Journalism is offered to students who want experience in news and feature writing.

"Its an interesting class for students," stated Dana Sartain, QV layout and news editor. "The class stucture creates lots of opportunities to meet members of the college community. The writers follow a beat, like any news reporter, covering campus happenings and events. Editors work closely with the reporters assigned to them," she concluded.

Art and Photography Editor Dan Perez announced that the Quo Vadis darkroom on the third floor of College Center will be open to all registered students three nights each week starting in January. "We saw a need to offer fellow students an area with less use restrictions than those in the JLC," he stated. "Hours will be 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday through Thursday but can be modified depending on individual needs," concluded Perez.

"This has been a good year for the paper," added Wilson. "Advertisers have allowed us to upgrade existing equipment to create a more professional paper. We are also looking into the purchase of additional computer monitors and the creation of a LAN network for the Spring. An Internet hookup is also in the discussion stage," he concluded.

Other new spaper activities include the twice yearly Recognition and Awards Dinner and club sponsored trips. This year's trips will be to Washington, D. C. and Boston. The Washington trip will include a private White House tour as well as possible meetings with New Jersey Legislators.



Community Food Bank Seeks Volunteers

Almost one million people in New Jersey go hungry every day. The Community FoodBank of NJ, an area non-profit organization, needs volunteers to help feed them.

Each year, the Community FoodBank distributes between ten and fourteen million pounds of groceries to homeless shelters, emergency pantries, soup kitchens, senior cutzen programs, child care centers, and battered women's shelters in New Jersey.

Due to overproduction, mislabeling, and other circumstances, twenty percent of the food produced in America is never sold to consumers. By reaching out to the food industry, the FoodBank is able to obtain food that would otherwise go to waste.

Many companies donate food that may be slightly blemished yet still edible. Other manufacturers donate food that still has some shelf life left, but not quite enough time to be distributed to retail stores.

The FoodBank needs volunteers to help distribute donated food to over 1,200 nonprofit groups in eighteen New Jersey counties.

According to Volunteer Coordinator Donna Groskoph, "Volunteers are our lifeline and are always needed here at the Community FoodBank. They help us sort and repack donated food and non-food products for distribution to other non-profit agencies. All we ask is for the volunteers to call and schedule the day and time they would like to come."

The FoodBank is located at 31 Evans Terminal Road in Hillside. Volunteer hours are from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday; and 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Saturday.

to get more information. All of the schools were located in California or Colorado. All were large, state universities.

Why did I waste time, during finals week, trying to get information about transfer requirements at the MCC transfer center? Obviously, I was in the wrong place. I was under the impression that the center should provide the information in a timely manner. The counselors seemed to believe I should track the information down myself, without any assistance from them other than an occasional phone number.

I think the center should do more to assist students who are going on to four-year institutions. With entrance into college becoming more and more competitive, applicants, especially from community colleges, need the professional guidance necessary for a successful transfer.

We need to have comprehensive, current information available on most major schools in the United States and abroad. Students need someone who is knowledgeable about the transfer process and requirements. If they don't have the information, it should be in their job description to obtain it, not to leave it up to the applicant to track it down, decipher it, and make out their own schedule according to what they believe is necessary. That could lead to a lot of wasted time and money, when you wind up taking the wrong class or having to repeat it somewhere else.

Since this is a two-year school, most students need to go somewhere else to complete their education. Whether it be a university or technological school or whatever, every MCC student has the right to expect caring professional to guide their choices. With the cost of education today, we should demand it.

Don't let this holiday season of reunion become a holiday season of bereavement.


During the holiday season, there are always parties going on, and parties usually involve alcohol.

According to the Middlesex County Intoxicated Driver Resource Center (IDRC), in 1992 and 1993, there were 15,777 injuries and 17,461 fatalities in alcohol-related traffic accidents nationwide.

A report from the U.S. Department of Transportation showed that more than 1.6 million drivers were arrested in 1992 for driving under the influence of alcohol or narcotics: an arrest rate of 1 for every 108 licensed drivers in America.

Donna Frandsen, BSW, director of the County of Middlesex Department of Human Resources Intoxicated Driver Resource Center, stated, "The fines and fees associated with drinking and driving can total \$8,000 for the first offense and the loss of driving privileges for 6 months to 1 year."

Friends don't let friends drive drunk. And if you are going to parties during this holiday season, make sure that you don't drink and drive. You are not just doing a favor for the people you might kill or seriously injure — you are also doing yourself a favor.

To keep a tree fresh, eut half an ineh from the bottom of the tree and put it into a stand that holds at least 2 gallons of water.




There is nothing that can be added to water in order to prolong the life of a Christmas tree.
