Any memories from 9 00:00:46,800 --> 00:00:49,640 your childhood that you're especially fond of that 10 00:00:49,640 --> 00:00:58,220 resonates with you? I was in school, I was in 11 00:00:58,220 --> 00:01:04,340 Catholic school, Fidel came to Cuba, all of the 12 00:01:04,340 --> 00:01:07,520 school was closed and I went to public school. 13 00:01:07,780 --> 00:01:14,280 That was a very bad time for me. So the shame for 14 00:01:14,280 --> 00:01:17,900 Catholic school, private school to the public 15 00:01:17,900 --> 00:01:21,640 school was not good? He closed all the Catholic 16 00:01:21,640 --> 00:01:24,560 schools. Why did he close the Catholic schools? He didn't 17 00:01:24,560 --> 00:01:29,080 want the Catholic religion to... They keep the 18 00:01:29,080 --> 00:01:33,840 church open and you can go to the church but not

19 00:01:33,840 --> 00:01:36,080 the schools. School is for the public school. 20 00:01:39,180 --> 00:01:43,000 Okay, the second question, how did you meet your 21 00:01:43,000 --> 00:01:51,460 husband? When I was 18 years, I was studying in an 22 00:01:51,460 --> 00:01:59,260 accounting institute in another town. I had to go 23 00:01:59,260 --> 00:02:05,840 to an institute. I went to the bus every day to go 24 00:02:05,840 --> 00:02:08,740 to the school but I had to walk in from the 25 00:02:08,740 --> 00:02:14,080 station bus to the institute. He was working in 26 00:02:14,080 --> 00:02:19,440 one company in between, that's how I met him. So you 27 00:02:19,440 --> 00:02:23,640 ran into him? No, he went outside and [whistles]... So he called 28 00:02:23,740 --> 00:02:29,940 you down. That's why you 29 00:02:29,940 --> 00:02:37,880 know, to get my attention. And follow me driving 30 00:02:37,880 --> 00:02:42,720 a motorcycle. Follow me to the bus station and 31 00:02:42,720 --> 00:02:46,640 back and forth every day. Oh, [in Spanish] halagada, halagada. 32 00:02:46,640 --> 00:02:50,860 That's how it started. 33 00:02:53,880 --> 00:02:57,280 The next follow-up question I have is, did you 34 00:02:57,280 --> 00:03:01,100 know he was an opposition activist involved with 35 00:03:01,100 --> 00:03:04,760 the Bay of Pigs fighters? Did you know that he was 36 00:03:04,760 --> 00:03:08,680 involved with the Bay of Pigs fighters? What do

37 00:03:08,680 --> 00:03:16,920 you call in Spanish? The revolution? Yeah, but the 38 00:03:16,920 --> 00:03:20,660 next Bay of Pigs... 39 00:03:23,760 --> 00:03:27,360 Conspiracy against the government. Against the 40 00:03:27,360 --> 00:03:33,160 government. You want to put down the government. I 41 00:03:33,160 --> 00:03:36,780 found that when we were... 42 00:03:40,020 --> 00:03:44,080 [in spanish] Comprometido, . He was in 43 00:03:44,080 --> 00:03:47,700 engagement, you know? And he had to leave in Cuba 44 00:03:47,700 --> 00:03:51,760 because he was involved against the government. 45 00:03:51,760 --> 00:03:55,520 And when you met him, did you know right away or 46 00:03:55,520 --> 00:03:59,260 how long after? No, after, after. A while after? 47 00:03:59,600 --> 00:04:04,680 Not really. A while, maybe one year after. I found 48 00:04:04,680 --> 00:04:08,040 out. You have to leave and you have to leave. 49 00:04:09,380 --> 00:04:13,360 That's why he left before me. Right. But we signed 50 00:04:13,360 --> 00:04:16,180 a paper before he left. We signed a paper, you 51 00:04:16,180 --> 00:04:19,860 know, the Married papers. And that's why he can ask me 52 00:04:19,860 --> 00:04:21,140 to come into United States. 53 00:04:25,360 --> 00:04:29,120 The next question. How was your experience as the 54 00:04:29,120 --> 00:04:33,840 fiancé of the activist of the revolution a few

55 00:04:33,840 --> 00:04:37,480 years after the Invasion and the Cuban Missile Crisis 56 00:04:37,480 --> 00:04:40,300 Yeah. What's difficult, you know, 57 00:04:40,380 --> 00:04:46,040 because we make... When I was 18 years, we get 58 00:04:46,040 --> 00:04:50,300 into United States when I was 24. That time was 59 00:04:50,300 --> 00:04:56,540 very... You know, a part from him was difficult. You 60 00:04:56,540 --> 00:05:01,380 know, because in last year you feel very... You 61 00:05:01,380 --> 00:05:03,960 know, it's your best time of your life. And you 62 00:05:03,960 --> 00:05:07,640 lost all that step of your life. It's not easy. 63 00:05:08,240 --> 00:05:12,920 Right. Because he was... How the country... It's 64 00:05:12,920 --> 00:05:17,140 not easy. It wasn't easy. Sometimes I was thinking 65 00:05:17,140 --> 00:05:17,840 to break. 66 00:05:20,540 --> 00:05:24,860 Well, you stayed together. Yeah. Okay, I have another 67 00:05:24,860 --> 00:05:27,620 question like that. When your fiance proposed, 68 00:05:28,080 --> 00:05:30,820 were you worried about the impact on you or your 69 00:05:30,820 --> 00:05:33,900 family, on your future family? Oh yeah. Because I 70 00:05:33,900 --> 00:05:38,820 had to leave my mother behind me. Yes. And how was 71 00:05:38,820 --> 00:05:43,540 that? Like how did you tell them? Yeah. I was... 72 00:05:43,540 --> 00:05:47,300 My mother said to me, I'm happy you leave this

73 00:05:47,300 --> 00:05:49,780 country because that country is no future for the 74 00:05:49,780 --> 00:05:53,920 young person. It's okay, but I want to live in 75 00:05:53,920 --> 00:05:57,180 this country because my life was all here. Right. 76 00:05:58,160 --> 00:06:01,000 And that was... An other step. That was so very 77 00:06:01,000 --> 00:06:05,020 difficult for me. Very, very. Yes. Because it was 78 00:06:05,020 --> 00:06:10,400 between my culture and... I never know what I'm 79 00:06:10,400 --> 00:06:13,520 going to find out, you know? Because my 80 00:06:13,520 --> 00:06:16,520 relationship with him was only for one year. It's 81 00:06:16,520 --> 00:06:21,900 not time to find out how we work together. It was 82 00:06:21,900 --> 00:06:26,200 so... Believe me. I don't know, it was my step-on 83 00:06:26,200 --> 00:06:29,260 -up. It was very difficult. Yeah. 84 00:06:33,780 --> 00:06:36,660 How did you feel when your husband had to leave 85 00:06:36,660 --> 00:06:38,520 Cuba? I mean, you kind of talked about this back. 86 00:06:38,840 --> 00:06:42,140 To leave Cuba and exile for Spain four days after 87 00:06:42,140 --> 00:06:46,580 getting married and you had no celebration. You 88 00:06:46,580 --> 00:06:49,640 know, in my age, that's something you can't 89 00:06:49,640 --> 00:06:53,420 expect. Because when you get met and when you get 90 00:06:53,420 --> 00:06:56,780 engaged, when you think about your wedding day and

91 00:06:56,780 --> 00:06:58,880 your dreams, 92 00:07:00,320 --> 00:07:05,420 since you are 15, 16 years, you think about your 93 00:07:05,420 --> 00:07:08,560 future, your wedding day, you know? Believe me, it was very difficult. 95 00:07:15,360 --> 00:07:18,240 You know, the situation, my country situation 96 00:07:18,240 --> 00:07:22,160 was... was no good. Your life, future, your future, 98 00:07:26,980 --> 00:07:30,740 your life, and your actual life. 99 00:07:33,640 --> 00:07:37,260 I believe it was difficult. 100 00:07:38,760 --> 00:07:43,520 Very difficult. So, when you left, did you ever 101 00:07:43,520 --> 00:07:45,540 think, since you said it was difficult, did you 102 00:07:45,540 --> 00:07:49,120 think you would see him ever again? When he left 103 00:07:49,120 --> 00:07:51,640 and it's been years? We're keeping on touch by 104 00:07:51,640 --> 00:08:01,840 phone calls, by letters. You know? We never lost 105 00:08:01,840 --> 00:08:04,900 the touch. He called me every week, every week. 106 00:08:05,500 --> 00:08:13,500 They sent letters every... You know? I was... He 107 00:08:13,500 --> 00:08:17,480 was... You know, I feel that he went to waiting 108 00:08:17,480 --> 00:08:21,080 for me. I was... And that was reality. He was

109 00:08:21,080 --> 00:08:25,800 waiting for me. He didn't meet anybody. Because he 110 00:08:25,800 --> 00:08:29,720 left you and he started working and saving money, 111 00:08:30,260 --> 00:08:33,540 thinking to bring me to United States, to start 112 00:08:33,540 --> 00:08:40,080 the family. You know? I was 18, 19, 20, 21 years. 113 00:08:42,020 --> 00:08:45,420 It's your best life. The best time of your life. 114 00:08:45,600 --> 00:08:49,140 Okay, you are understand now. Soon after your husband left, you were 117 00:09:03,140 --> 00:09:06,800 placed on a work camp for three years. You 118 00:09:06,800 --> 00:09:10,560 explained before. Everything was bad. 121 00:09:21,900 --> 00:09:24,640 Everything was very bad for me. You know? Since 122 00:09:24,640 --> 00:09:29,580 you left, you know? Leaving me in Cuba, Married 123 00:09:29,580 --> 00:09:33,520 only by papers. And you know, the people 124 00:09:33,520 --> 00:09:36,800 go, "oh, you're Married and your husband left 125 00:09:36,980 --> 00:09:40,980 you." Ah, the boy, yeah. And then went to the camp 126 00:09:40,980 --> 00:09:46,680 to work in, you know, to... The best work is very,

127 00:09:46,680 --> 00:09:52,620 very bad. Very bad. I feel lonely, you know? 128 00:09:53,120 --> 00:09:56,720 Lonely. Right. And you made some friends you said 129 00:09:56,720 --> 00:10:00,700 too. Right. Like, you had some friends. And the 130 00:10:00,700 --> 00:10:04,720 camp? Yeah. My friend from this school, you know, 131 00:10:04,800 --> 00:10:09,820 all my co... The people that were in this school 132 00:10:09,820 --> 00:10:14,100 with me, I was visiting different houses, you 133 00:10:14,100 --> 00:10:20,300 know, like cards. It's not... No. You have to keep 134 00:10:20,300 --> 00:10:22,720 you know, very low because you are Married. 135 00:10:25,680 --> 00:10:28,780 It's... Something is not normal. It's not normal 136 00:10:28,780 --> 00:10:32,660 situation. For one, go out of the 20 years, 19, 20 137 00:10:32,660 --> 00:10:37,160 years, not normal. That's why no... No party, no 138 00:10:37,160 --> 00:10:40,760 bars, no dancing, no... No dancing. 139 00:10:44,480 --> 00:10:47,560 You feel... Widow, you know what is... Widow 140 00:10:47,560 --> 00:10:54,300 that's how you feel widow. 141 00:10:54,300 --> 00:10:58,600 Okay, I'm gonna pause it... 142 00:11:00,380 --> 00:11:11,220 But the camp... Okay. Hold on. So... When you're 143 00:11:11,220 --> 00:11:15,960 working in the camp... Uh-huh. Did you expect... 144 00:11:17,940 --> 00:11:21,840 To be there for... The three years? No, I was

145 00:11:21,840 --> 00:11:26,360 there only two years. After I put all my papers on 146 00:11:26,360 --> 00:11:32,860 the embassy, I had to wait for my... The time I 147 00:11:32,860 --> 00:11:36,100 can leave in the country. That's why I was only 148 00:11:36,100 --> 00:11:38,660 two years, not three years. Because the first year 149 00:11:38,660 --> 00:11:42,280 I had to fix all the papers and go to the embassy 150 00:11:42,280 --> 00:11:46,400 and request, you know, the permission of 151 00:11:46,400 --> 00:11:49,180 everything. Yeah. It's only two years, but it was bad 152 00:11:49,180 --> 00:11:53,620 Two years, yeah. Because the first year I 153 00:11:53,620 --> 00:12:00,080 was just preparing all my papers. Yeah. I was... 154 00:12:00,080 --> 00:12:05,600 You know, believe me. My... My... Time between 155 00:12:05,600 --> 00:12:09,700 18... 19, because the first... When I was 156 00:12:09,700 --> 00:12:17,540 making... 19 and 23... 157 00:12:17,540 --> 00:12:20,620 I came to United States. It was Very 158 00:12:20,620 --> 00:12:26,200 bad. Especially because I had to take the 159 00:12:26,200 --> 00:12:29,340 decision, you know, to take the decision to leave 160 00:12:29,340 --> 00:12:33,980 the country. I'm... Go to another country. 161 00:12:35,440 --> 00:12:38,780 I'm... No, speaking English, no, you know. Or 162 00:12:38,780 --> 00:12:45,820 leaving behind Cuba. You have... I

163 00:12:45,820 --> 00:12:53,560 have a... Sorry. That's so good, yeah. Do you want 164 00:12:53,560 --> 00:12:57,580 water too? I have a pump here. And you have to 193 00:14:43,100 --> 00:14:47,200 clean, you know? All the beans. The beans, the 194 00:14:47,200 --> 00:14:50,820 coffee beans. Yes. They have to clean out the 195 00:14:50,820 --> 00:14:55,020 little stone or the something that's coming with 196 00:14:55,020 --> 00:15:02,820 the... The... Yeah. When they take out the beans 197 00:15:02,820 --> 00:15:04,060 from the... 198 00:15:06,780 --> 00:15:12,860 Ah, the... So yeah. The... The... The bean is

The shell the... 203 00:15:36,120 --> 00:15:37,400 204 00:15:37,400 --> 00:15:41,480 So, time when they take off the shell, it's 205 00:15:41,480 --> 00:15:44,640 something pieces still, and you have to clean. 206 00:15:45,780 --> 00:15:48,940 That's the... The woman do... The woman with... 207 00:15:48,940 --> 00:15:51,100 the kids. They do at home. They bring all 208 00:15:51,100 --> 00:15:54,580 these big 209 00:15:54,580 --> 00:15:59,620 containers and they have to clean the coffee for 210 00:15:59,620 --> 00:16:01,800 the dog. They pay, you know they pay to the 211 00:16:01,800 --> 00:16:04,820 people, they stay at home. How is the pay though? 212 00:16:04,820 --> 00:16:08,340 Nothing. Nothing. 213 00:16:12,200 --> 00:16:16,780 And they have families and children. In my case they don't allow me 214 00:16:16,780 --> 00:16:20,080 to do because I never have a kid. That's how I 215 00:16:20,080 --> 00:16:23,540 had to wait till they come. And do they go around and 216 00:16:23,540 --> 00:16:26,140 check you and like check what you're doing. Yeah, 217

00:16:26,400 --> 00:16:30,040 they check me every day, you know. I didn't do 218 00:16:30,040 --> 00:16:33,700 anything. You did the put my beat. What did you do 219 00:16:33,700 --> 00:16:43,060 again? I had to remove the weeds for the vegetable 220 00:16:43,060 --> 00:16:47,960 and the plant vegetable and you had to clean all 221 00:16:47,960 --> 00:16:52,740 the weed. The sun in Cuba is very strong, 222 00:16:52,740 --> 00:16:58,400 very hard, very hot. That's what you play this. 223 00:16:59,560 --> 00:17:02,960 Oh, you have your big hate, oh yeah, my [in spanish] pamela. 224 00:17:06,200 --> 00:17:10,680 Yeah, a long leaf. Well now I have a problem with 225 00:17:10,680 --> 00:17:15,200 my skin because you know, the semara. You're used 226 00:17:15,200 --> 00:17:19,700 to years. You cover yourself. Yeah. 227 00:17:25,740 --> 00:17:29,760 I had another question about how you and your husband 228 00:17:29,760 --> 00:17:33,400 keept connection and you said. Yeah, we were 229 00:17:33,400 --> 00:17:36,400 connected all the time. Yeah, by phone and by the 230 00:17:36,400 --> 00:17:39,540 letters. She said like, oh, we have like one so 231 00:17:39,540 --> 00:17:44,140 week or so. Yeah, every week, it got me every 232 00:17:44,140 --> 00:17:47,520 two weeks because you know the calls. Years ago, 233 00:17:47,600 --> 00:17:51,360 50 years ago was, you know, communication was 234 00:17:51,360 --> 00:17:56,100 difficult, you know. Yeah. But we can talk to my

235 00:17:56,100 --> 00:18:00,920 phone. I had to work from my house to the station, 236 00:18:01,360 --> 00:18:06,600 the phone station and they connect the lines to 237 00:18:06,600 --> 00:18:09,860 talk. Not in my house. I can't talk in my house. I 238 00:18:09,860 --> 00:18:13,200 had to go to the telephone station to talk to him. 239 00:18:14,000 --> 00:18:16,940 Especially we call from outside the country. 240 00:18:17,060 --> 00:18:23,040 Right. Yeah, it was very, you can't imagine. Yeah. 241 00:18:24,900 --> 00:18:29,360 You know, and the wire and the old phone, 242 00:18:29,360 --> 00:18:35,640 have to do with it. And then that's to communicate it. 243 00:18:35,660 --> 00:18:36,160 Yeah. 244 00:18:40,480 --> 00:18:44,500 Now, it's talk about leaving Cuba. So how was the 245 00:18:44,500 --> 00:18:46,760 process of leaving Cuba and meeting your husband 246 00:18:46,760 --> 00:18:51,220 in Spain? How did it happen? What was the process? 247 00:18:51,500 --> 00:18:58,340 Like how did you finally get papers? Proved. I 248 00:18:58,340 --> 00:19:00,600 don't know. I don't understand. No, I don't 249 00:19:00,600 --> 00:19:04,720 understand the question. So how was it leaving 250 00:19:04,720 --> 00:19:10,380 Cuba to go to Spain? Like when you met your 251 00:19:10,380 --> 00:19:13,360 husband in Spain, back in Spain, after the few 2.52 00:19:13,360 --> 00:19:19,480 years. Yeah, no, but I know he, I come meeting in

253 00:19:19,480 --> 00:19:23,300 Spain because he left Spain before me. Before, 254 00:19:23,600 --> 00:19:26,920 because he left Spain to United States before I 255 00:19:26,920 --> 00:19:31,180 left Cuba to Spain. I'm meet him in United States. 256 00:19:32,720 --> 00:19:37,060 When I flew from Cuba to Spain, he wasn't there. 257 00:19:37,300 --> 00:19:40,200 He was in United States. Fixed all the 258 00:19:40,200 --> 00:19:43,940 documentation for me to get my visa, my approval, 259 00:19:44,600 --> 00:19:46,660 my residence. When I came to United States, I have 260 00:19:46,660 --> 00:19:50,440 a resident on the airport. I come in with the 261 00:19:50,440 --> 00:19:53,740 resident already. I didn't have to wait for 262 00:19:53,740 --> 00:19:57,220 resident. When I stepped into United States, my 263 00:19:57,220 --> 00:20:05,540 resident was gone. Yeah. My work's permission was 264 00:20:05,540 --> 00:20:08,240 done. Everything was okay. I had to wait five 265 00:20:08,240 --> 00:20:13,460 years to be a citizen. American citizen. That I 266 00:20:13,460 --> 00:20:16,900 had to wait five years. After five years, I was a 267 00:20:16,900 --> 00:20:19,620 American citizen. And you had to take a test, 268 00:20:19,860 --> 00:20:24,340 probably, yes. How is that? Five years, I was 269 00:20:24,340 --> 00:20:29,240 the... I learned all the questions, you know? It 270 00:20:29,240 --> 00:20:33,300 was easy questions. Who was the first President of the US?

271 00:20:33,300 --> 00:20:36,480 And you started studying all the 272 00:20:36,480 --> 00:20:42,860 questions, you know? Yeah. Yeah. I passed. I 273 00:20:42,860 --> 00:20:48,720 passed. That's good. Of course, yeah. So when you 274 00:20:48,720 --> 00:20:52,880 left Cuba, you went to Spain. Yeah, he was already 275 00:20:52,880 --> 00:20:55,240 in United States. When was he in Spain for? He was in 276 00:20:55,240 --> 00:20:57,520 Spain for 18 months. And you were in Spain? 277 00:20:57,520 --> 00:21:01,340 I was three months until he fixed all 278 00:21:01,340 --> 00:21:05,240 the papers on United States.
