Kean Credits Available on MCC Campus

Starting this semester, Middlesex County College is giving its students and Kean University students an opportunity to take classes at MCC that will count towards a bachelor's degree in education at Kean.

The largest two-year feeder school of education majors to Kean University is MCC, and students who plan to transfer there to earn their bachelor's degree can take classes at MCC that will count as credits at Kean. This also applies for students who

already attend Kean but live close to MCC.

Frank Osborne, chairperson of Middle and Secondary Education at Kean University, said the course that is currently being offered is Technology and the Young Child.

This program is designed for students who plan to major in Elementary Education, Early Childhood Education and Physical Education at Kean University, said Osborne.

These courses will also be offered for the fall 2008 semester. They will be held on Mondays at 5 p.m. MCC students planning on taking the courses can do so as a visiting Kean student, he said

"One advantage to MCC students is that the course and its credit appear on a Kean transcript," said Osborne.

"They would not interfere with the guaranteed transfer credit afforded to MCC students with associate degrees when they transfer to Kean under the new Transfer Credit law," he said

A new course will be added for the fall 2008 semester, as well. Geog 2010-World Geography will be offered on Tuesday evenings at 5 p.m.

Although Kean does not require geography, a pre-requisite of geography is required before students


partake in any social studies courses, said Osborne.

There are advantages to this program for both Kean and MCC students. Kean students who live in the Edison area benefit from the fact that the MCC campus is much closer to them than Kean's campus, he said.


"Not only is it convenient, but they might save on gas by cutting back on trips up to Union. We are grateful to the enthusiasm of the MCC students in selecting Kean and we are hoping to make things even more advantageous to [sic] them," said Osborne.

Somatokinetic Workshop Introduces Stress Relieving Techniques to Students

On March 31, the Northeast Holistic Center held a Somatokinetic workshop in the IRC building to share their experiences with new forms of health and healing.

Caroline Bayard, founder of the Northeast Holistic Center located in Belleville New Jersey began studying holistic healing after years of battling with spinal injuries. After four years of in depth research, Bayard used "Holistic Synergy" which the center defines as the combination of natural remedies to help cure pain, to create a place to study and experience many forms of natural healing. Her lectures focus on documented research and development of new and existing natural health and healing remedies.

Bayard said, "No matter what the age, the healing takes place. If you are working on the elderly, suddenly they're not stiff. If you're working on the very young, they respond also."

All through the workshop students and faculties were introduced to new techniques using these natural pain remedies such as Light Touch and Orthbinomy.

Bayard began by the workshop demonstrating by Light Touch. This process begins by determining which leg is longer. The longer leg is determined to be the weaker one and that is where Light Touch does the job of moving stored stress up the spine. This is done by the practitioner placing one finger on the buttocks while gently applying pressure up the spine with another finger.

If done properly the exercise will release all the stress that has build up in the upper back and shoulders. For Trudi Harris-Johnson, this was more than a demonstration.

When Bayard demonstrated Light Touch on Harris-Johnson, she noticed that Harris-Johnson had a lot of stress and tension buildup. Once she was finished, Harris-Johnson was amazed by the relief she was feeling.

"I need to know who you guys are so I can start making appointments" she said. "This is something I need to do regularly."

Bayard also demonstrated Orthobionomy which was founded by Dr. Arthur Lincoln Pauls D.O in the early 1970's. It was created by two arts: osteopathy and Judo.

The concept of this is to straighten out and energized the spine by having a practitioner stretch and apply pressure to the back of the neck. This helps relieve upper body stress and tension.

Other tips that were shared by Bayard and her staff to help the healing process were to always reach down to type on the keyboard which will relax the shoulder

muscles and lay off the carbohydrates which help feed the existing yeast in your body.





They were working so intensely, you could almost see the smoke coming out of their ears!


When the ashes had settled MCC had its first Sudoku champion, Matt Biderman.

The Exhibition BODIES Dissects Human Anatomy For All Eyes To See

At the South Street Seaport Exhibition Hall you can find one of the most amazing displays you'll ever see, called "BODIES, The Exhibition." Similar versions of this exhibit have traveled around the world dating as far back as

1995, and finally it's conveniently available for us!
"BODIES, The Exhibition" is

"BODIES, The Exhibition" is an exquisite and enigmatic display of human dissections that have been preserved and presented in a thoughtprovoking and often whimsical manner.

The exhibit features formerly living human beings who have had the liquid removed from every cell in their

bodies and replaced by silicon polymers, which harden during their curing process.

What is left is a completely visible permanent display of muscles, bones, tendons, ligaments, organs and blood vessels. The specimens are displayed complete in action positions, like shooting a basketball, or as individual parts for closer examination. My favorite was a skeleton who was dancing with her own muscles and nerves. In order to better view the desired parts of the body, the skin is generally removed prior to the preserving process.

The human body is a most

remarkable machine and the opportunity to see it like this should not be missed. One display has a specimen cut into seven thin slices from head to toes so you can see how everything fits together vertically.

Another is cut into horizontal wafers. A very dramatic room in the exhibit displays only veins and arteries without any other body parts.

The circulatory system is preserved in red polymer and to see the beauty and complexity of this is incomparable. Without bones, organs, or flesh you can see the perfect shape of the entire body mapped out in what looks like fine red threads.

Different rooms feature different body systems. There are also examples of diseased organs for you to see. The black lungs of a smoker, for example, make a pretty dramatic presentation. One specimen has things like hip replacements and head and bone plates, so you can see what advances the medical profession has made.

There is also a room featuring embryos and fetuses, which can be avoided if you choose to do so. I personally found it every bit as fascinating as the rest of the exhibit.

"BODIES, The Exhibition" has created some controversy as it's traveled around the world. The biggest issue seems to be that all of the specimens are Chinese and many appear to be quite young. Given China's policies on human rights, some people have wondered about the morality of the exhibit,

considering we can't be sure that the specimens chose to be exhibited. According to the literature, made available by the exhibitor, all specimens died of natural causes and had their remains donated to medical schools. The exhibit in New York has 17 complete specimens, fifteen males and two females, as well as many separate organs and parts.

The three hours I spent in the exhibit left me with the utmost respect for the incredibly complex machines that we are, and gratitude to the scientists, doctors and donated human cadavers who made the experience possible. We are truly a beautiful miracle. Do take advantage of this unique opportunity to see what you're made of!

Tickets need to be purchased in advance, and in order to control the number of people in the exhibition hall, when ordering tickets, a starting time needs to be chosen. You can order tickets through Ticketpro.net or call at 1-888-9BODIES

The exhibit will run 7 days a week until June 30 at the South Street Seaport Exhibition Hall, 11 Fulton Street on the corner of Front Street in Manhattan. Tickets cost between \$26.50 and \$27.50.

MCC Offers New Scriptwriting Class

If you're a lover of visual arts and expressing yourself, the Scriptwriting class offered by Professor Benjamin Marshall may be the perfect fit. Scriptwriting was initiated when Marshall was approached with the opportunity to develop this course, and he was pleased to see students joining. He, "I think it attests to the students' interests and ambitions."

Only in its second semester, the average class load is 18 students, which Marshall believes is close to the ideal size. Every class, students are gathered in a circle, and this process is very significant within the course itself. Gathering in such a way allows students' scripts to be heard, an opportunity for more attention to be given, less of a chance to hide yourself, and most importantly, it allows for instant feedback based on the observations of others' expressions.

Professor Marshall said he believes "a lot of learning comes from a kind of osmosis. That is, you absorb things from other students—what works and what doesn't. The students learn a lot more, even the smallest things such as punctuation." In the past, there has even been talk of turning scripts from students into plays performed by the Backstage Players Club, but nothing has been set in stone so far.

Marshall said, "I think what surprises many students is that once you take away the special effects, name actors and elaborate scenery, what is left is a script. The techniques in putting the script together are the same techniques that established playwrights used—even Shakespeare."



The Riches Starts Its Second Season on FX

On March 18, the second season of FX's series "The Riches" kicked off. Eddie Izzard stars as Wayne Malloy, along side Minnie Driver playing his wife Dahlia Malloy. The family also includes three children; Cael (Noah Fisher), Di Di (Shannon Marie Woodward), and Sam Malloy (Aidan Mitchell).

What sets the Malloy family apart from any other TV family is that they have a secret. They are con artists, and have stolen the identities of an extremely wealthy family from Baton Rouge, Louisiana, who died in a car accident. That family was the Riches

Wayne has assumed the identity of Doug Riche while Dahlia has assumed the identity of Cherien Riche. The Malloy's have completely adopted the Riche's lives. Their clever children assist Wayne and Dahlia by performing tricks of their own. Cael is skilled at picking locks and disabling alarm systems. In the season two premiere, he hotwires a car in order to steal it. Di Di pickpockets and Sam, the artistic one, can also speak French.

The plot of the series is unique and clever because, despite being such

con artists, the Malloy family doesn't appear to have the villainous persona that you might expect. You see them as any other loving family who cares about each other – despite the lifestyle that they lead.

The episodes will keep your attention and entertain you as long as you remember that what you're watching is just a television show. Much of "The Riches" is incredibly unbelievable and sometimes you'll be left wondering, "How do these people get away with all of this?" Yeah, they're con artists, but the magnitude of conning that the entire family-accomplishes over the course of the series is unrealistic. Doug Riche's occupation was a lawyer. With no legal experience at all, how can Wayne do a successful job at adapting to and taking over Doug's career, including his relationship with his clients and coworkers? Ah, the magic of television...

The good thing is that if you set that aside and just focus on watching the episodes without really thinking, you'll find a very enthralling show.

In the second season premiere, titled, "The Last Temptation of Wayne," the family splits up as Dahlia and the children head off to Mexico with the real Cherien Riche's mother, who suffers from dementia. Wayne stays behind in

Baton Rouge, where they have been staying, to deal with Pete, a family friend of the Riche's, who is on to the family's scam. Pete has the power to end the Malloy's scheme – however, he runs into his own problems when Dale, Dahlia's cousin, who also wants to be in on the plan, needs to silence him for his *own* agenda.

At one point during the premiere, a security guard from the gated community where the Malloys live, stops by when Wayne's (or Doug's) car is parked illegally. After several gunshots, he investigates inside the Riches' house - ignoring the dead body that is hidden in the car's trunk after hearing the victim's cell phone ring from inside the trunk. To some, that may just seem laughable. But, if you enjoy mindless entertainment, you'll find the scene suspenseful and enjoyable FX's "The Riches" is a truly unique, entertaining, television show with a clever plot - if you're willing to suspend your disbelief for an hour or so. It is television, after all, and as a television show, it delivers. The second season just started last Tuesday, so you're not late at all if you want to tune in. The Riches" airs Tuesdays at 10 p.m. on FX.

The foundation is called the "Save a Life Tour" and Reed feels that wherever he goes, he can make a positive impact on someone's life.

"I feel this would really show

students how it's like to get behind the wheel when you are really intoxicated. It's so dangerous and some kids think that they are invincible until something terrible happens. We try to make the message clear. Don't wait until that moment happens. Just be safe and stay away from the wheel," said Reed.

Dan Lercher, who attended MCC has strong feelings on the subject: "I would never drive drunk. It's too much of a risk. I've seen my friends get in trouble from drinking and driving. It's not worth the consequences."

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The Doctor is Back with Horton Hears a Who

The doctor is back in business. That's right, everyone's favorite childhood storyteller, the late Dr. Seuss, has been

brought to big screen again. Thanks to directing from Jimmy Hayward Steve Martino, "Dr. Seuss' Horton Hears Who!" blends the timeless story with ever improving computer technology, making the movie's visuals absolutely phenomenal. Looks, however, do not make a good movie. It has to have a story and an excellent cast of characters in order to do well both at the box office - and in the minds of its critics. The filmmakers have managed to turn this very short story (originally just 58 pages, of which most are illustrations) into a very entertaining one at that. The main focus of the story is Horton, of course, hearing a Who, and the lengths to which he will go to save his microscopic new

friends. The script also takes us deeper into the big lives of the little citizens of Whoville, starting with the Mayor (Steve Carell), who we find out has 96 daughters and a son. In one memorable scene, the mayor talks to each one of his kids for 15 seconds each - that would make anyone sweat. It makes you wonder when he finds time to run the town! The main stars deliver brilliant takes on their characters, with Carrey leaving his typical sarcasm at home and giving Horton a sweetness that's contagious. His performance is equally matched by Carell, whose Mayor is constantly on the run, dealing with city and family problems alike. The rest of the cast is perfectly matched with their characters, giving Seth Rogen (Knocked Up), Jonah Hill (Superbad), Will Arnett (Arrested Development), and Amy Poehler (Saturday Night Live), among others, perfectly animated alter egos to have fun with.

The cast members flow wonderfully with one another and bring together a story that everyone can really enjoy. "Dr. Seuss' Horton Hears a Who!" is one for all ages "no matter how big or small."



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
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
