The hulking construction site at the head of Lot 1 on campus will soon become the finished product of The College's effort to provide improved facilities for students and faculty. Crabiel Hall will be ready to open to students this coming spring 2011 semester.

"The College believes in the importance of providing state-of-theart facilities to students and faculty rather than facilities that are merely adequate," said Patrick Madama, the executive director of marketing and college relations.

When Crabiel Hall opens for the Spring 2011 semester, it will offer students amenities which enrich the teaching environment, such as a full size demonstration kitchen for culinary arts students, as well as practical utilities like wireless Internet connectivity throughout the building.

Additionally, Crabiel Hall will house multi-use classrooms and new computer labs, reducing the stresses on the computer labs and classroom scheduling across campus, Madama said.

Crabiel Hall will



also provide benefits to the community at large in Middlesex County. A wing of the new building will serve as a conference center when not being used as classroom space. This flexibility is achieved through collapsible and movable walls. This is a significant improvement over the current arrangements where space for conferences and other events is made by taking room away from students in the College Center. The new Crabiel Hall also benefits administrative staff by consolidating offices, such as the offices of Community and Continuing Education, into a single building.



During the 2010 the summer break The College lost one of its brightest and most talented students, Vinny Desario.

Desario was beaten into a coma after a misunderstanding while he was in Wildwood, N.J. for a golf tournament with other student golfers. He remained in a coma for two weeks before he died.


Desario was a member of the Phi Beta Kappa Honors Society and was scheduled to graduate a week after the attack with a degree in Liberal Arts Business.

"Vinny was a man surrounded by love. He always thought of others before himself. There was not one person who did not like him due to his outgoing and

positive characteristics," said Andrew Dulina, a close friend of Desario's.

A Facebook group named "Vinny Desario, stay strong we ALL love you" was made the week he was attacked and has over 700 members. Messages from Desario's friends, family and even people he didn't know flooded his group page with love, prayers and supportive messages for him and his family.

"Vinny was a great person," said Stephanie Rodriguez, close friend of Desario as well as one of the creators of his Facebook group. "The one most important thing I admired about him was that he loved and cared for everyone. He never believed in hating anyone and that's why so



many people loved him. If there was ever a problem or advice you needed he was always there. You wouldn't find one person that has something bad to say about him.'

Desario's Facebook group scheduled a community prayer on May 20, the day Desario was supposed to graduate from The College. On July 16,

an open mic was organized

in honor of Desario and the proceeds from the open mic went directly into the Vincent Desario Charitable Trust.

needed since "bad" acts could be pulled on the spot while on stage.


In order to insure that the show didn't start paying

is to be its final trip before it returns, permanently, back to its Egyptian homeland. We beheld 10 galleries and 130 artifacts of golden treasure splendors on the legendary King and his life. The tomb was first discovered in 1921 in Cairo at the Valley of the Kings by Dr. Howard Carter and his team. Tutankhamun was born in 1341 BC, the son of Akhenaten and one of his sisters thus; perhaps, causing Tut's various deformities. X-rays show that the boy king had the genetic deformity of Scoliosis (curvature of the spine). He took the throne in 1333 BC, the 18th dynasty, at the age of nine. When he became king, he married his half sister, Ankhesenepatan, They had two daughters, both stillborn. King Akhenaten believed in worshipping one God -- causing an upheaval in society. When Akhenaten died, the monarchy passed over his 6 daughters unto

that Tut died as a result of a blow to the head. Actually, the opening in the brain cavity may have been caused by the embalming process which removed vital organs – that were buried separately.

A cast copy of Tut's remains is also on display. After 3,000 years, the body cannot be removed from its Egyptian location without the fear that it may turn to dust. This minor king is more popular in death than he was in life.

John Hoffman, a shareholder the law firm Wilentz, Goldman & Spitzer P.A. and the legal counsel to Middlesex County College since 1964, is the 2010 L'Hommedieu Award recipient.

The L'Hommedieu Award is named for Paige D. L'Hommedieu, the founding chairman of the College's Board of Trustees, a humanitarian who worked tirelessly on behalf of his fellow citizens. It is presented annually by Middlesex County College to an individual who exemplifies those characteristics. The award was presented by Dorothy K. Power, the chairman of the College board, during the Fall Convocation on August 30. During the ceremony, Mr. Hoffman received a resolution by the Middlesex **County Board of Chosen** Freeholders, presented by Freeholders Ronald Rios, Blanquita Valenti and Mildred Scott. He was also recognized with a Joint Resolution of the New Jersey State Senate and General Assembly, which was presented by Senate Majority Leader Barbara Buono.

"John is a man of the people and a pillar of the community," Senator Buono said. She also offered best wishes for a great year to the College community. "Without a doubt, Middlesex County College is the best community college in the northeast because of how well it is run and how far it has come," she said. Mr. Hoffman, who graduated from Georgetown Law School in 1963, has been a distinguished member of the New Jersey legal and business community for almost 50 years.

"I have been counsel at Middlesex County College for over 45 years and the representation of this outstanding institution has been one of the highlights of my legal career," Mr. Hoffman said. "I was privileged to represent the College when Mr. L'Hommedieu was chairman of the Board of Trustees. He was a man of integrity with great leadership skills. Mr. L'Hommedieu and the original Board of Trustees set a standard of excellence for the College that has been maintained throughout the history of the College."

Thomas Tighe, the vice president of the Middlesex County College Board of Trustees, nominated Mr. Hoffman for the L'Hommedieu award.

"He is a pillar of society, with an incredible commitment to Middlesex County College and the community at large," Mr. Tighe said. "He has been the College counsel since the very beginning of the institution and is an encyclopedia of knowledge about where we've been and where we are going. He always has the best interests of students and faculty at heart. He is well respected within legal circles and is very involved with

numerous civic organizations. John is a man of unquestioned integrity and one of the classiest guys I know."

Dorothy K. Power, chairman of the Board, echoed Mr. Tighe.

He is also a member of the Middlesex County College Foundation.

Mr. Hoffman serves as construction counsel to the Middlesex County Utilities Authority, and special counsel to the New Brunswick Housing Authority and the New Brunswick Parking Authority for redevelopment issues, and special counsel to the Middlesex County Improvement Authority for open space acquisitions. He has also represented PSE&G and New Jersey Natural Gas in regulatory matters

He has won numerous honors, including the Torch of Liberty award from the Anti-Defamation League, an honor recognized in a Joint Legislative Resolution of the New Jersey Senate and General Assembly; he also received the 2007 Saint Thomas More Award from the Diocese of Metuchen.

He was recognized by the Middlesex County Chamber of Commerce as a Community Leader of Distinction. In 2000, he was voted "Citizen of the Year" by the Woodbridge Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Hoffman is the former managing partner of the Wilentz law firm. At Wilentz, his areas of expertise include Municipal Authority Law, Public Utility Law, Administrative Law and Redevelopment Law.

Every year, new college students are walking into an unfamiliar environment and every semester are still uncertain on what to expect. In large part this is due to the lack straightforward advice and prior experience of professors; advice and answers to questions such as "Which professors should I take?" and "Is this professor difficult or boring?" While academic advisors are there to help, their responses are limited and lack the blunt honesty of fellow students with prior experience. The thought of trial and error terrifies students especially when considering the cost of attending college. The type of "evaluations" that one would see written on the walls of a bathroom stall or on desks in the library are streamlined and placed on the internet for anyone to see with vulgarity and misspellings intact. It's not the most desirable source of

information, but it's better than nothing.

The internet's largest listing of collegiate professor ratings-with more than 6.8 million student generated ratings of over 1 million professors known as RateMyProfessors. com-is frequently utilized as a reference tool by students when registering for classes. Online since 1999, RateMyProfessor.com currently offers ratings and evaluations on college and university professors from over 6,000 schools with thousands of new ratings added each day.

However, the amount of influence this has over class registration tendencies has sparked criticism by both faculty and students, but mostly professors. Exactly which are genuine evaluations and which are just plain vindictiveness? Some of the primary objections to using RateMyProfessor.com points to the motivation. Only students that are extremely (dis)satisfied bother to use the website which could lead to bias and tampering. Attractive and easy professors tend to receive higher overall scores, and it's all anonymous. All of this leads to an obvious disingenuous representation of professor quality. While such

criticisms are valid to some degree, the majority of college students are quite capable of filtering out both extremes of bias as should the professors when reading their evaluations, keeping in mind that dimwits exist on both sides.

Should students be allowed to have at least some knowledge of what to expect from their classes? Yes. But should students behave like a customer when using such websites and treating professors as some kind of product, seeking the most "bang for their buck" so to speak, when registering for classes? Perhaps. After all, a tremendous amount of money is invested on

Please Rob Me: Location Based Social Networking

Hey, do you have a Twitter, Foursquare, or a Facebook account? Have you ever noticed certain social networking features that allow you to display your general or exact location? While these are exciting features, they are also potentially dangerous. The danger lies in publicly broadcasting to the world where you are, your exact physical location, but more importantly where you are not: your home.

All is fun and games with social networking sites and applications until they are put into perspective. Social networks are already enormous and continuously growing, making it easy to lose track of exactly how much information one is giving up and where. The website PleaseRobMe.com displayed, among other things, a random live feed of recently empty homes listing them as "New Opportunities" for anyone to observe. (This feature has been disabled.) Despite this provocative site feature, the creators of PleaseRobMe. com stress that they are not encouraging criminal activity but the contrary. They argue that they are attempting to spread awareness of such selfinflicted dangers by placing the users of Twitter, Foursquare, Facebook, and other social networks with location based information on notice. Essentially

a redesigned Twitter search page, no extra step was taken to obtain the information displayed information that anyone can access.

While such sites are well-intentioned and seek to raise awareness, they are wide open to abuse. It is possible their creators are doing the wrong things for the right reasons, ultimately facilitating an otherwise nonexistent form of theft. However, if an individual is careless enough to disclose personal information publicly, it could be argued that it is that person's own fault if any misfortune occurs. This should serve as an incentive to be mindful of one's personal information and how it is disclosed.

Sharing too much information on the internet, knowingly or not, is a danger that can be easily avoided through privacy controls. Granted, publicly broadcasting that. you are not home does not necessarily mean that the home is vacant, thus not only putting your own safety at risk but your family's safety as well. While most of this might seem like common sense, the threat of identity theft as well as physical harm and potential stalkers via social networks does not appear to deter the usage of location based applications. Now that you have the facts, think twice before broadcasting too much information on your whereabouts. Remember,
